SERVICE TO HIS COMMUNITY

Mr. Joseph Cohen has retired as president of the Jewish Community Council of Greater Kansas City, after serving in that capacity for six terms. It was he who stimulated the establishment of the Council in the late 1930s, when he foresaw the need for a central community "voice," a delegated Jewish body which could speak and act with authority on matters concerning the Jewish community as a whole.

As Mr. Cohen points out in his annual report, the Council was born at a time of great Jewish tragedy, and practically knows nothing of what is usually termed as "normal times." Yet, even in a disturbed world, in which there have been many grave national and international problems to be solved, under his leadership, the local Council has brought innumerable accomplishments to the Community by helping to strengthen Jewish life, stimulating coordination of communal activities, and bringing about better understanding between the Jewish and non-Jewish communities.

Under Mr. Cohen's guidance, the disturbing problem of kesseruth administration was solved, a public relations program was created to combat anti-Semitism, a relationship was established with The Chronicle to send the paper to every Jewish family to create a better informed community, through the army and navy committee the needs of servicemen and women in our area were cared for, and countless other projects of importance were undertaken.

It has been a job well done. Under Mr. Cohen's guidance, a solid foundation for Jewish community programming has been laid, and we may look ahead with hope and confidence that, in our Community Council, we have achieved that solidarity and coordinated community thinking and action which contributes toward a better life.

THIS AND THAT AROUND TOWN

Armourdale Will Again Be a Prosperous Community With Homes and Big Industries With Important Payrolls

There will be an Armourdale.

A new Armourdale will rise from the flood ruins. It will be an Armourdale where people will live close to their work as they did before Friday the thirteenth.

It will be the Armourdale of small and large industries, of many businesses concentrated on two main streets, Kansas and Osage avenues. It will have a new complexion, but the people who were driven from Armourdale will come back and their work shops will be there.

Armourdale can be reborn only with generous government aid. And that assistance should be forthcoming. The nation's leaders have seen the vast ruin. They are ready to help.

Whether the people will return to live in high apartment houses, planned as a redevelopment, patterned after similar projects in other metropolitan areas, or whether smaller apartments and homes will be built, provides an interesting debate.

The apartment plan was blueprinted first. It was presented to the housing committee as the national housing agency was being asked to furnish temporary housing for the 3,000 families, whose houses were

ruined.

Until the apartments or the garden type development is ready, hundreds of families will live in trailers in an emergency city, laid out on the site of the Old Homestead golf course.

Already the city authorities have arranged to provide sanitary service to the Old Homestead area, to police it, to install recreational facilities—literally to make it a small city.

There is enthusiasm for this emergency city. There is considerable apathy toward the apartment plan, especially from the resident with families, who can not visualize comfortable living in ten-story buildings. Most people want to live in their own home.

Influencing the planners to recommend the apartment development were speed and economy. The apartments could be completed in about fourteen months and for about 60 per cent less money than the garden type improvement, they say.

These claims are disputed by the opponents of the plan. The debate is lively but without rancor. Both sides are trying to help in the most critical period that any community ever faced.

In Washington

WITH REP. ERRETT P. SCRIVNER

The flood and its terrific aftermath still occupies a position of prime importance.

Despite many promises made to me that corners would be cut, the red tape encountered in getting federal assistance to the people that need it—NOW—seems almost insurmountable.

Nearly every time I have talked to some Federal Agency suggesting various courses of action I am told that it could not be done that way.

Many amendments will be offered to existing laws in an effort to eliminate some of the restrictions and make more aid immediately available.

Perhaps it is old fashioned thinking but it looks to me like Uncle Sam ought to be able to find some way to do as much (or more) for our own folks as we do for foreign countries, for instance, we are rebuilding much of the Philippines. Why not rebuild Iowa, Ottawa, North Lawrence, Armourdale, Argentine and many other places? With the entire nation aware of our plight I am certain we will get full cooperation.

The flood problems are many. One by one, we will lick them. Wherever you think we can help let us know, we will do our "darndest" to get the job done.

No one knows exactly how many casualties we have inflicted upon the enemy in the Korean war. The best estimate is about one and one-fourth million. Reports indicate that the Korean war, up to July 31, has cost us right at TEN BILLION DOLLARS (10,000 million dollars).

Assuming that is the correct guess (and it may be more) it has cost us \$8,000 to kill, maim or capture each enemy soldier. How long can we keep going at that rate?

A statement often made is that Lenin once said, "Someday we shall force the United States to spend itself into destruction."

The police force personnel has had a big job on their hands since that memorable Thursday on July 12. Day and night work, hard and disagreeable, thrilling and dramatic and above all, nerve-wracking was the lot of the men whose usual duties were those of peace officers. And they performed well, starting with the evacuation of Argentine and Armourdale as the flood waters threatened the lives of thousands of our people as well as total property destruction.

Some sightseeing motorists were heard to complain that the cops were too tough. If there could be any criticism we feel it should be that the men on the streets, on the motorcycles and in the prowl cars were not nearly tough enough. This in spite of the fact that drivers would insist on holding up traffic to try and argue with the men who were directing things and straining every nerve to keep vital traffic moving. The men out there in the middle of two lines of cars had infinite patience, they were firm but never snarly. This we know for we were guilty of trying to argue a couple of times. We have this extenuating circumstance however for we had two or three passes into the Armourdale district, which unknown to us had been revoked less than a day after being issued.

Chief Swarner and Lieutenants Jones and Riley spearheaded the organization. Norbie Jones paid a high compliment to Earl Swarner for his quick and efficient handling of every new situation and Lieutenant Jones also said the quick turnout of the entire group of our civilian emergency police made possible the quick evacuation of Argentine and Armourdale.

And while not classed as police officers we are going to give credit at this time to Commissioners Becker and Blake, who helped fight the rising waters near the west Kansas avenue bridge, getting out less than five minutes before the tide topped the dike in the early morning of Friday, the 13th.

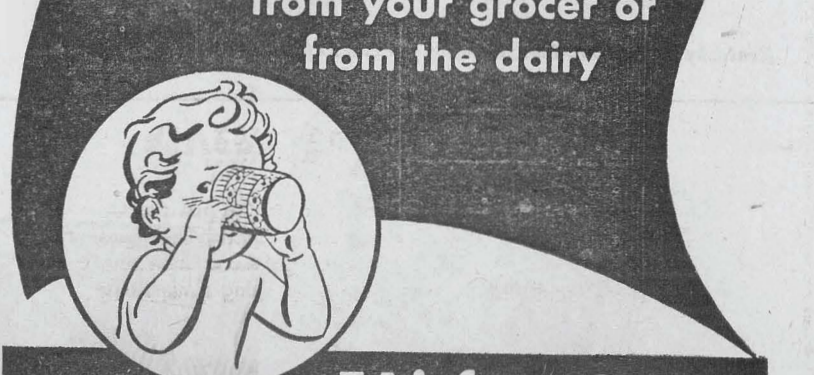

Refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the meeting, adding the final touch to a program of unusual merit.

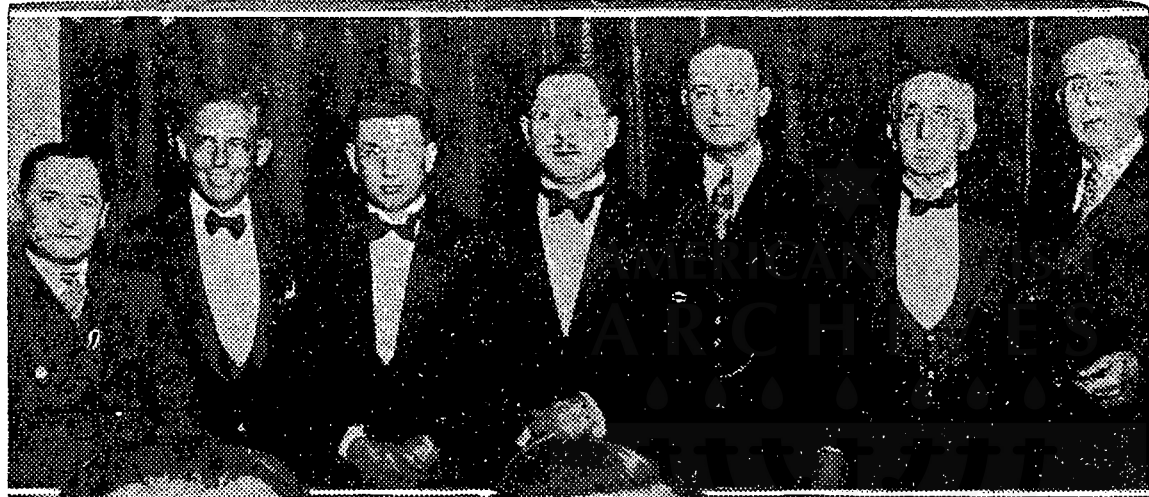

Rude Community building at East Colfax avenue and Williams street.

Ceremonies of the occasion, especially the initiation of a class honoring Alfred M. Cohen at 8 o'clock Sunday night, and the formal dedication of the building at the same hour Monday night, will be most impressive, according to A. B. Hirschfeld, general chairman in charge of all arrangements and vice president of the Denver lodge.

CINCINNATI JEW WILL SPEAK

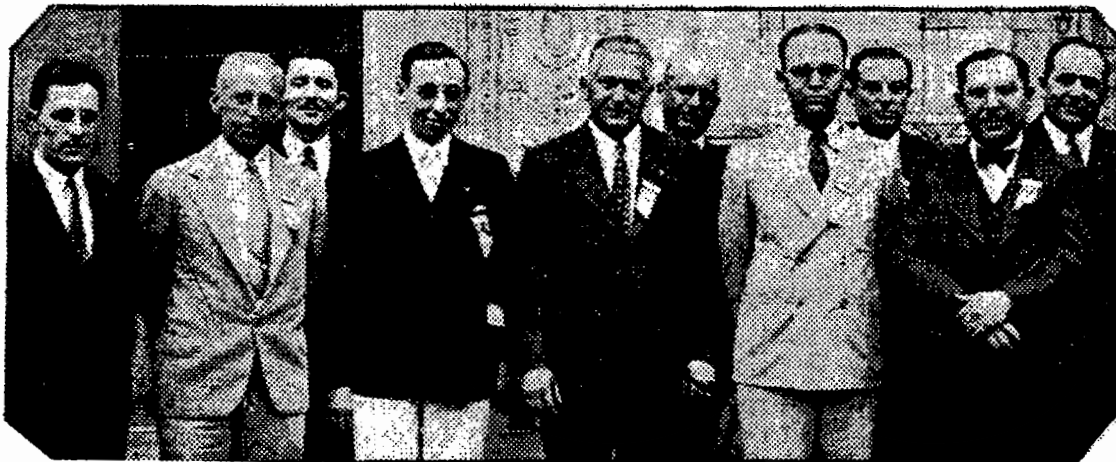

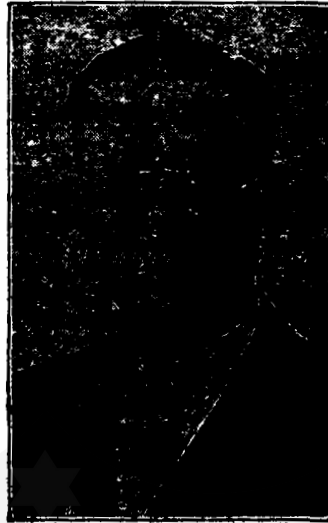

SPEAKER TRACES HISTORY OF JEWS

Gan Eden Lodge, B'nai B'rith Holds Open Meeting Monday Evening.

"The Jewish people in this country simply ask for the opportunity to do their part and they shall give more to its structure than they have in the past," was the substance of an address by Joseph Cohen, first vice president of district grand lodge No. 2 before an open meeting of the B'nai B'rith last night.

Tracing the history of the Jews briefly since the expulsions of Spain and Portugal, Mr. Cohen pointed out that the Jews were not particularly welcomed by Stuyvesant when they first settled in New York, but to give thanks to this new land for its semi-political freedom, and to the future United States of America with its political emancipation after 1825, the Jews have given unstintingly to every American crisis since the revolutionary war. Furthermore, they have contributed to American culture, labor stability and politics. He said:

"Today, the United States is threatened by a form of racketeering which has penetrated every field of legitimate endeavor. To help alleviate this situation and again contribute to the well-being of this country, the B'nai B'rith, which in its ritual calls for a love of country second only to God, has used every instrumentality at its command. It has formed naturalization and Americanization classes to make the Jewish population 100 per cent American. It has developed the A. Z. A. and Hillel foundations to give the youth of this country a proper understanding of their duties."

The B'nai B'rith, concluded Mr. Cohen, is the watchdog of Jewish life and liberty in this country. In our security, he said, we must not forget that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, and he cautioned the Jews of this country to keep on guard lest conditions similar to those in Germany take root here.

In honor of its distinguished visitor, Gan Eden lodge initiated the Joseph Cohen class of candidates, David Rubin, Bernard Perry and Leon Jurofsky of Paris, Ill.

Kusworm, on behalf of Goldstein's friends, presented him with an all-leather golf bag.

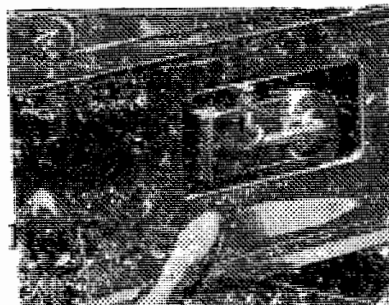

Following the darkness of the night comes the sunshine of the dawn. Out of the gloom of the depression will come a bright tomorrow.

In the spirit of optimism, Jews must face the trying period of economic unstability which has encompassed us. The children of Israel

have a history behind them that is replete with darkness, despair and so-called "hard times," yet our eyes have always been turned expectantly to the East from where we know will

come the rising sun to dispel gloom and darkness.

The greatest misfortune which has overtaken our people in these times is the spirit of apathy which men assume towards things spiritual and philanthropic. Pressed with their own troubles of a material nature, men have lost their ability to evaluate the things of the spirit. There is a constant urge, now greater than ever, to look after one's own well-being and to forget others, though they be in need of succor.

The past one hundred years has been a glorious epoch in Jewish history in America. During this period we have established scores of hospitals, sanatoria, orphanages, homes for aged and Jewish community centers. We have established our congregations and have built splendid temples and synagogues in which to worship our God. We have established our charity groups, our free loan societies and our Talmud Torahs. Unto all of these we and our fathers before us have given inestimable time and effort and our love and devotion.

Now at the end of this golden period, Jewry finds itself at a critical point. Will we carry on these great institutions and organizations which we have built so painstakingly, or will we, because of the throes of the depression, permit them to go by default and be liquidated because we are unwilling to give of ourselves and of our money for their support?

Practically every Jewish organization faces this problem. The B'nai Brith, which was born on the tidal wave of the German-Jewish immigration to this country ninety years ago, has reached a preeminent place in Jewish life in America. Through its Anti-Defamation League it has

become the recognized champion of Jewish rights and liberties against insidious libel and slander by Jew-baiters and chronic anti-Semites and through its Hillel Foundations in eight of the great universities of this country and its A. Z. A. Chapters in one hundred fifty cities in the United States, it is laying the groundwork for keeping American Jewish youth faithful to the religion of their fathers.

We do not live by bread alone. Man's spiritual life must be fed just as much as his physical being, otherwise we have no right to boast a high state of civilization. Jewish life in America, which has grown rich both materially and spiritually during the past golden century under the guarantees of civil and religious liberty, must not be permitted to atrophy because of our unwillingness in these times of stress to contribute our full measure of devotion.

If we do not lose faith and do not lack courage we will meet the brighter day that is sure to come as strong and virile as ever, but if we fail in our duty towards our spiritual life we will find that when conditions do change we will have permitted our greatest assets to have been taken from us by reason of our defaults.

Let us therefore, dig in deeper and work harder to the end that we may maintain Jewish life unimpaired so that we may pass along to our children a heritage as rich and as beautiful as that which we have enjoyed.

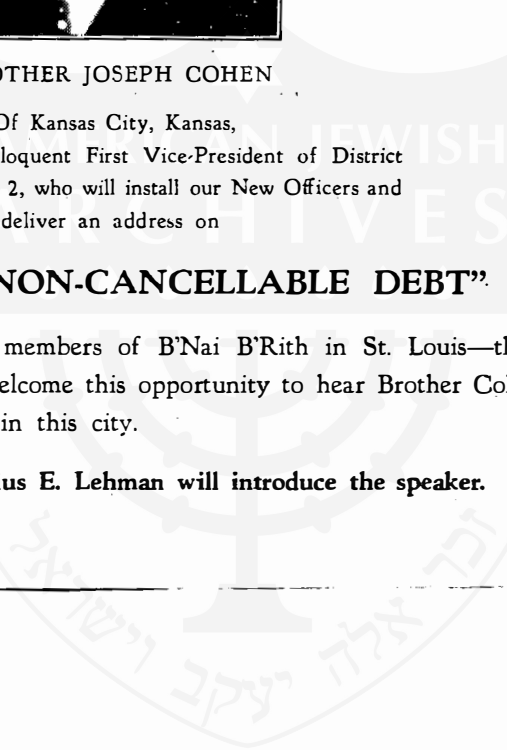

HITLER PLAYED BY B'NAI B'RITH

Leaders Oppose Formal Protests Sponsored by Society.

With the election of 1933-34 officers and the selection of a meeting place for next year, the 81st convention of district grand lodge No. 2, B'nai B'rith was ended Tuesday morning.

The final session closed one of the most spirited conventions in the history of B'nai B'rith, for in it was determined the attitude several thousands Jews in the Middle West will take toward Adolph Hitler's anti-Semitic rule in Germany.

Cohen Elected

The delegates just before adjourning elected Joseph Cohen, of Kansas City, Kan., to succeed Samuel Goldstein, of Dayton, O., as president of the district.

Philip Weisberger, of South Bend, a member of the executive committee of the South Bend lodge which arranged this convention, was honored with a place on the general district committee. This committee, having charge of all B'nai B'rith business between conventions, is the most responsible one in the order.

Other new officers include: Louis Kranitz, St. Joseph, Mo., first vice president; Justin Sillman, Columbus, O., second vice president; Leonard Freiberg, Cincinnati, O., secretary; and Lou M. Frank, Toledo, O., treasurer.

Next year's convention city will be St. Louis, Mo.

A resolution finally adopted late Monday afternoon discourages Jewish protest meetings on the theory that they "make it all the harder on our Jewish brethren in Germany." The B'nai B'rith, according to the resolution, will seek relief for German Jews through the cooperation of Christian nations.

Adoption of the resolution, however, followed a stormy session in which the B'nai B'rith anti-protest attitude was vigorously denounced as "sluggish." Rabbi S. H. Markowitz, of Fort Wayne, and Michael Sharlitt, of Cleveland, both opposed the resolution. They denounced it with such vigor that their speeches, bringing many of the delegates to their feet, threatened to disrupt the session. They decried the policy of "watchful waiting" which B'nai B'rith and the American Jewish association have been practicing in regard to the

German situation, and pleaded for action in relieving the 500,000 Jews in Germany.

It was Charles Rosenbaum, of Denver, vice president of the American Jewish association, and Sidney G. Kusworm, Dayton, O., a member of the B'nai B'rith executive committee, who restored the convention to order. They promised that although B'nai B'rith would frown on protest meetings, it would work ceaselessly in bringing worldwide pressure to bear on Hitler.

Enlist Christian Aid

Protest meetings held in America after first reports of Nazi persecutions last winter only succeeded in making the German Jew's lot harder, declared Kusworm. "We must enlist the aid of our Christian friends in fighting a Christian bigot."

Another method of bringing anti-Semitism in Germany to an end was voiced at a dinner program Monday night by Sigmund Livingston, for 20 years chairman of the order's anti-defamation league.

"We must fight this issue not as a Jewish fraternity, nor as Jews," he said, "but as Americans. It is an American issue. Through organization we can impress upon the American mind the evil to come from permitting Nazi propaganda to spread through this country. America has enough hatred, without transplanting here the hatreds of Europe."

Spread Propaganda

"The Nazis have organized in this country no less than in any other. They are prepared to spread their anti-Semitic literature. I am here to say we will give them a great battle."

"The Nazis say the stories of atrocities against the Jew are untrue. I do not know—maybe they are. Maybe not a single Jew has been mistreated physically. But how can they deny atrocity when they have deprived the Jew a right to follow his vocation? When they have expelled 197 of their leading university professors because they are Jews? When they have boycotted us? I say this the worst atrocity ever perpetrated."

Mr. Livingston, who has done more than any other Jew to develop B'nai B'rith from a group of lodge men to an organization for the advancement of world peace, charity and culture, spoke as one whose idealism for a golden future has not diminished in years of discouragement. He pictured a "breakwater of human kindness to shelter the hopes and dreams of humanity" that will be built when nations and races discard their hatreds and prejudices.

The Monday night banquet was the social highlight of the convention. Dancing was included on the program.

Before Livingston was introduced, District President Samuel Goldstein, presented all past presidents of district No. 2 who were present. They included I. N. Hines, president in 1891 and 1892, and Sol S. Klizer, head of the order in 1896 and 1897. They were the best past presidents at this convention.

Joseph Cohen, Kansas City, Kan., was elected president of the district lodge, moving up from the first vice presidency. B'NAI B'RITH CONVENES HERE

RACIAL CHARITY IDEALS LAUDED BY GOLDSTEIN

District Grand Lodge President Delivers Final Address.

FLAYS HITLERISM

Urges Full Support of Wider Scope Movement.

Urging his brethren of B'nai B'rith lodges through the middle west to carry on the ideals of charity and racial understanding which he has worked to develop during his administration, Samuel Goldstein, district grand lodge president of Loraine, O., opened the 81st annual convention of district No. 2, B'nai B'rith this morning in the Oliver hotel.

It was his final address as president, and in it he reported what B'nai B'rith had accomplished since a year ago when he took over the reigns of district No. 2 activities. He also listed his recommendations for work during the coming year.

Deploing the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Germany during the past several months, the president spoke of efforts of B'nai B'rith to assist the unfortunate Jew in that country.

"Turning the clock back to the Dark Ages, the German Student corporation announced that in all universities in Germany special bonfires would consume all books written by Jews. Private libraries were rifled for such works and public libraries ransacked. All German literature from Heinrich Heine to Feuchtwanger was buried last month."

Speaking of the relief work in progress to aid Jews emigrating from Germany to avoid persecution, Goldstein said:

"The Palestine government has granted a thousand immigrant admission certificates to German Jews planning to immigrate to Palestine. This number is in advance of the usual immigration schedule issued by the government.

"The president of the Jewish Consistoire of Belgium and the chief rabbi of Brussels have established a relief committee to take care of Jewish refugees who poured into Belgium within the last few weeks. It is estimated that 3,000 German Jewish refugees are in that country at present. In addition approximately 3,000 have entered Switzerland."

Goldstein recommended, however, that B'nai B'rith lodges refrain from participating in protest meetings bearing on the German-Jewish situation. "This, of course does not preclude individual brethren from doing as they please with reference to the matter."

The president asked his fellow lodgemen to concentrate their attention this year on their Wider Scope movement which functions to advance education among Jews. It sets up foundations in universities to organize centers for Jewish students, and assists these students in obtaining their education. Such foundations have now been set up at these universities: Illinois, Wisconsin, Ohio, Michigan, California, Cornell, West Virginia and Texas.

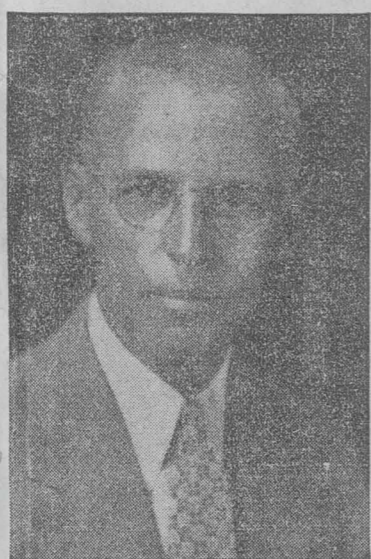
Urges Support.
"I recommend," said Mr. Goldstein, "that all of the lodges during the coming year, concentrate on Wider Scope activities and do everything possible to pay to the Wider Scope fund a sum equal to at least \$5 a member; that in order to accomplish this purpose dances, balls, bazaars, picnics and other social activities be indulged in order to raise the respective quota, and that the lodges cooperate fully and completely with the Wider Scope director."

Other recommendations made by the retiring president follow: an executive committee, consisting of the chair officers and past presidents and such other members as the lodge shall determine, who shall meet not less than once a month to consider matter pertinent to lodge welfare.

"I recommend that the law of the district be so changed as to make it optional with the lodges whether or not to charge an initiation fee.

"I recommend that there shall be appointed in each lodge in this district a committee, known as the advisory committee of the A. Z. A. who shall from time to time attend meetings of the A. Z. A. committee with the members of the lodge and advise with them."

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 14—As a result of yesterday's elections during the closing session of the annual convention of Grand Lodge B'nai Brith, Second District, Joseph Cohen, of Kansas City, Kan., is president of the Order. Delegates to the convention decided to hold the 1934 convention in St. Louis.

Louis Kranitz, of St. Joseph, Mo., was elected first vice-president. Other officers were elected as follows: Justin Stillman of Columbus, O., second vice-president; Leonard H. Freiberg, Cincinnati, secretary, and Lou M. Frank of Toledo, treasurer. Freiberg and Frank were incumbent officers. Mr. Kranitz is the only new officer.

Rabbi Markowitz contended that B'nai Brith is not opposed to protests held under "ostensibly non-Jewish auspices", but the convention was against encouraging such protests lest they appear to be instigated by Jews, he said.

Sydney G. Kussworm of Dayton, O., reviewed practical accomplishments of B'nai Brith and pointed out that the organization is behind most of the steps taken by the government at Washington in behalf of the Jews.

Joseph Cohen was graduated from the Everett grade school and from Wyandotte high school. He attended the University of Kansas and the University of Colorado. He received his law degree eight years ago from the Kansas City School of Law.

ACTIVE IN THE WORK.

Mr. Cohen's term as first vice-president of the district was characterized by great activity. He recently completed a membership drive in the district which, despite conditions, was one of the most successful ever held in that territory.

Mr. and Mrs. Cohen have a son 2½ years old.

District No. 2 Denounces German Anti-Semitism, Effects Economies, and Elects Youngest President

JOSEPH COHEN, Kansas City, Kan., the youngest man ever to hold the office, was elected president of District No. 2 at the District's eighty-first annual convention in South Bend, Ind. Louis Kranitz, St. Joseph, Mo., was named first vice president; Justin Sillman, Columbus, O., second vice president; Louis M. Frank, Toledo, O., treasurer, and Leonard H. Freiberg, Cincinnati, O., secretary.

Samuel Goldstein, Lorain, O., the retiring president, opened the convention. A number of economies was effected, including the elimination of the "Mirror" for the ensuing year. A "World's Fair Class" of candidates from various lodges was initiated. Sidney G. Kusworm, Dayton, O., member of the Executive Committee, read his annual report, and reviewed

the activities of the Order in its work to ameliorate conditions of Jews in Germany. Richard E. Gutstadt, Chicago, Director of Special Activities of the Order, appealed for cooperation in the raising of a special fund with which to counteract the anti-Semitic campaign of Hitler sympathizers in this country. A discussion on the German situation, led by Rabbis Myron Meyer and S. H. Markowitz, resulted in a vote of confidence in the Executive Committee. The policy of holding protest meetings sponsored by non-Jews was approved.

Sigmund Livingston, Chicago, chairman of the Anti-Defamation Commission, was the principal speaker at the convention banquet.

"The Nazis have established organizations in many parts of this country, including our universities," he declared. "We are fighting this battle as an American issue, not as a Jewish one. The atrocity denials are so absurd as to indict the German government before the whole world."

Brother Toby Brenner, Kansas City, Mo., a delegate to the convention, who recently returned from Germany, told of his experiences in a German concentration camp.

FIRST FEDERATION DRIVE CLOSES WITH JUBILATION

Leaders in Jewish Welfare Federation Drive Express Gratitude Over Community's Response to Initial Coordinated Appeal—Speakers at Workers Final Meeting Give Praise to General Chairman Fred Goldman for Excellent Leadership.

Participating Organizations to Receive Enough to Carry On Individual Work—"Y" Director Max Bretton Says Federation Will Enable "Y" to Function at Greatest Efficiency; Likewise With Other Participating Institutions.

Last Saturday night on the "Y" Roof Garden was an occasion for great rejoicing. Despite the fact that the initial Jewish Welfare Federation Campaign did not quite attain the \$110,000 goal when the final reports were made at the meeting, officially closing the drive, all were agreed that this first Federation appeal could be designated as the most successful Jewish communal project ever undertaken and carried through to an effective conclusion in the history of Kansas City Jewry.

On another point were all leaders agreed: They joined in giving unanimous praise to Fred Goldman, who as General Campaign Chairman, gave the most inspiring possible leadership. To Mr. Goldman's ability to fuse and harmonize the different elements which participated in the drive, high tribute was paid.

At the meeting last Saturday in excess of \$83,000 was reported, out of a total of more than 2,800 subscriptions, the largest number of contributors to any Jewish campaign ever held here. Mr. Goldman reported that a number of cards remained in the hands of members of the Board of Governors, and that it was expected within a week or ten days the business of the campaign would be finally concluded. Those who have not, for any reason, been seen or whose original subscription could be raised, were asked to send in checks and pledges to Louis Oppenstein, Campaign Treasurer, 1600 Linwood boulevard, Federation Headquarters.

Joseph Cohen, Co-General of the K. C. K. Division and member of the Federation Board, capably presided. Mr. Cohen paid high tribute to the workers' efforts, praising "the large total raised from a community hard hit by economic conditions."

Mr. Goldman commented upon the fact that the workers' efforts had permanently established the Jewish Welfare Federation of Greater Kansas City, which prior to the campaign had existed only on paper." He appealed to all workers who had participated in the Federation drive to join him in the Allied Charities Campaign in October, receiving an enthusiastic showing of volunteers.

In the reports made by each of the Generals, praise was given for the generous support accorded in each instance by other divisions, especially the mutual support given in these cases: Nathan Goldberg and Jacob Mnookin, Leon B. Fink and Leslie C. David, Irving Fane and Shirley Metzger.

General Chairman Goldman and Women's Chairman Mrs. Max Bernstein gave acknowledgement to their aides and the workers as a whole. Mrs. Bernstein reported 1,130 subscriptions for a total of more than \$10,000 by her division, or "over the top."

Among those who were introduced by Chairman Cohen were the following: Bernard Hurwit, Mrs. N. Peltzman, Rabbi Gershon Hadas, Rabbi S. S. Mayerberg, Louis B. Greenberg, Max Bretton, Hyman Gordon, Walter Negbaur, Harry Sheskin, I. W. Hearsh, Dan Sernes, and all generals present.

Mr. Goldman spoke of Mr. Bretton as his "Chief of Staff" in the campaign. Mr. Bretton stated that where previously a sense of fear had been created in the community that it might be necessary to close the doors of the "Y," that the Federation had made this impossible. He also said that the Federation would enable him to become a "Y" director instead of a "Fund-Collector."

Mr. Bretton commented that although the full amount of the goal by the various organizations had not quite been reached, that a sufficient proportion was in sight to enable each of the institutions to "carry on," and that each Executive would in the future be able to give his major attention to his work rather than to the task of securing money to maintain the individual institutions.

Mr. Hurwitz observed that The Federation had "brought about a re-birth of Jewish leadership in Kansas City."

Rabbi Mayerberg said that "the appeal reached out to include every phase and philosophy of Jewish life here in a single combined effort for the first time in local Jewish history." Rabbi Hadas declared that Judaism

and Jewish life were not to be found in any single Jewish institution but in the combination of all of them, and that through The Federation fusion and co-ordination, bringing order out of chaos, had been achieved. He stated that Louis H. Ehrlich, Federation President, had by his tact and skill in the preliminary organization meetings of The Federation, made its creation possible, and that Fred Goldman's splendid leadership had permanently established The Federation as the principal factor in local Jewish life.

Applause greeted the statement: "Rabbi Mayerberg and I and the Orthodox Rabbis must all co-operate. This Federation and no single Rabbi will be the spokesman for the Jewish community in the future."

Mr. Greenberg, Director of Publicity, acknowledged the fine co-operation of the daily press and The Jewish Chronicle. He paid special tribute to The Chronicle, "whose unrestricted co-operation in devoting the major portion of its space for five issues to The Federation Campaign contributed immeasurably to the drive's success."

Chairman Cohen, in presenting Mr. Greenberg, stated that the publicity and educational work carried on under the latter's direction caused virtually every Jewish resident of Greater Kansas City to be fully informed concerning The Federation and reduced subscription resistance to the minimum point.

General agreement was expressed that next year's campaign would be much easier to conduct, as the current drive was a pioneer one. The view was also presented that complaints of individual participating institutions would be virtually eliminated by next year.

In closing the meeting Chairman Cohen said: "This drive has ennobled Kansas City Jewry. This is a solemn and sacred occasion as we close this meeting and officially close this first campaign."

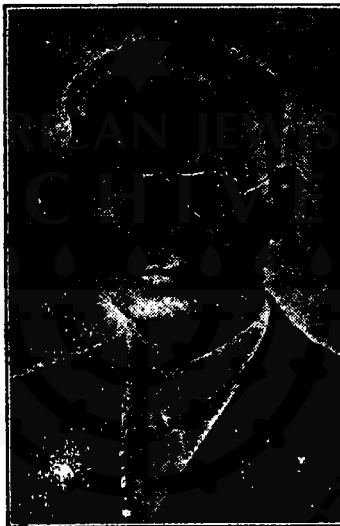
night at the B'nai B'rith building, Colfax and Williams street, for members of the order and their families at which Mr. Cohen will be the principal speaker.

NAZIS SPEND MILLIONS IN U. S. TO FIGHT JEWS, SAYS KANSAN

Joseph Cohen, District Manager of B'nai B'rith, Declares Hitler's Campaign Still Is as Cruel and Barbarous as It Was at Beginning.

Hitler's Nazi government in Germany is spending millions of marks in America to propagandize this country into an intolerant attitude against Jews, Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Kan., district manager of B'nai B'rith, charged here Tuesday.

Cohen is on a tour of the eight states from Ohio to Colorado comprising his district, stimulating the campaign of his order to combat this propaganda and to arouse both Jews and non-Jews to the situation in Germany. He is to speak at 8 p. m. Tuesday in the I. Rude B'nai B'rith Memorial building.

"The Hitler campaign against the Jews in Germany is still as cruel, as barbarous and as calculating as it was at its inception," Cohen said.

TURNING NOW TO COLD POGROM.

"It is turning now to a 'cold' pogrom, in contrast to the physical tortures that marked its beginning, in which Jews are denied every right with a view toward extinguishing them in the social order—a starving process in which the Jews are denied the right to leave the country with their property and save themselves.

"It is the purpose of B'nai B'rith to create a public sentiment among both Jews and non-Jews against such barbarity, savagery and reversion to medieval type.

"That purpose is having its effect. It is on this account that you see many Protestant ministers speaking out against the Nazi persecution.

GENTILES ENLISTED IN PROTEST CAMPAIGN.

"A petition is being circulated which will bear a million names of non-Jews to be presented to the United States government asking this country to do all it can within diplomatic limits to protest against the persecution of the German Jews."

Leaders of B'nai B'rith anticipated the coming to power of Hitler two months, Cohen said, and began formation of a united front of Jewry against his activities. They called in representatives of the American Jewish committee and the American Jewish congress and jointly formulated a campaign to combat Hitlerism.

B'NAI B'RITH CONTRIBUTES TO RELIEF IN EMERGENCIES.

Activities of B'nai B'rith are far flung, he pointed out. Its purposes include charitable work and it contributes to the support of five institutions in Denver, the National Jewish hospital, the Jewish Consumptive Relief society, the Ex-Patients home, the National Sheltering Home for the Aged and the Home for Jewish Children, as well as conducting direct relief in emergencies like floods and other disasters. In addition it carries on active Americanization work among Jewish youth and the promotion of tolerance between creeds.

Cohen is a lawyer. He is accompanied on his present trip by his wife. They leave here Wednesday for Colorado Springs and will continue on their tour from there.

SPEAKER DENOUNCES HITLER AS MONSTER

Fiend in Human Form, De-
clares Cohen

Germany under the leadership of Adolf Hitler is headed for an abyss, and the persecution of Jews by the Nazi government has deprived them of the chance to earn a livelihood, it was declared last night by Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Kan., district manager of B'Nai B'rith, in a talk before a group of prominent Denver residents in B'Nai B'rith Memorial Bldg., 1475 Williams st.

The Nazi government is carrying on an organized campaign in this country to justify its persecution of Jews, and many German students here on an exchange basis have made speeches attacking Jews, Cohen said.

"Hitler is the arch enemy of the Jew, a veritable fiend in human form," asserted Cohen. "He is a vicious, medieval figure, catapulted by circumstance into a position of power."

A "cold" pogrom is being carried on in Germany against the Jews, the Nazis having ceased physical violence in their campaign of racial hatred and resorting instead to the boycott, Cohen said.

He urged Jews to unite to force Hitler by diplomatic protest to cease the pogrom in Germany.

COHEN CHARGES GERMANY FIGHTS AMERICAN JEWS

President of District Grand Lodge of B'Nai B'Rith Outlines Plan to Oppose Propaganda

"In the free press of America and in the open minds of the American people rests the greatest security of the Jewry of this country," declared Joseph Cohen, president of the district grand lodge of the B'nai B'rith fraternal order, here Monday night.

In an address before the local lodge at Temple Albert, Cohen outlined the program being sponsored by the lodge to combat anti-semitic propaganda in this country.

Charging that the Nazi party of Germany was spending millions of marks to spread anti-semitic propaganda in America Cohen said that the chief function of the Anti-Defamation league, which has been organized by B'nai B'rith, would be to "keep public opinion unpolluted."

Atrocity Charges

Cohen repeated charges of atrocities of the Hitler government against the Jews of Germany, said that this had simmered down to a program of eliminating Jews from the political, economic and social life of the country, and declared that the "Friends of Germany" in America stressed the anti-semitic policy of the Hitler government while denying atrocity charges.

The lodge hopes to present petitions to the American government signed by more than 1,000,000 Gentiles protesting the German policy, Cohen said.

With Mrs. Cohen he will leave Tuesday for their home in Kansas City, Kans. They have been visiting chapters of the lodge in the Rocky mountain states.

Following the initiation, Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Kansas, president of the eight-state district, spoke interestingly and forcefully upon the condition of the Jews in Germany and upon the necessity for meeting a rising tide of anti-Semitic propaganda in America. He named and described various groups, which now are organizing for such persecution, pointed out that German exchange students to America are being selected with a view to their enthusiasm for Nazi anti-Jewish attitudes, that the Hitler autobiography is being circulated widely here and that rumors are constantly being spread that President Roosevelt is "under the influence of the Jews." The job of B'Nai B'Rith, Mr. Cohen declared, lies chiefly in disseminating facts to demonstrate the falsity of charges now being made against the Jews throughout the world.

B'NAI B'RITH STAGE SUCCESSFUL SESSION

DIGNITARIES OF JEWISH ORDER CALL IT BEST IN STATE HISTORY.

Formation of First State Association of Women's Auxiliaries Feature of Day-long Convention: to Kansas City in 1934.

Fully 400 visitors from throughout Kansas were in Coffeyville yesterday for the annual state convention of B'Nai B'Rith, Jewish fraternal and benevolent order, and gathering of the various women's auxiliaries of the state. Officials of the order declared it one of the finest sessions ever held in Kansas.

Morning and afternoon business sessions of the order were especially well attended and the banquet last night drew a throng of around 300 persons. Perhaps the most interesting event of the day was the organization of the first state association of women's auxiliaries in America, with Mrs. J. H. Rabin of Kansas City, Kansas, as its first president.

Outstanding in the morning sessions, in the opinion of officials of the order, were the address of welcome by Mayor R. Y. Kennedy and the report of State Deputy Dr. J. H. Rabin of Kansas City, Kansas, upon progress of the order in Kansas.

In the afternoon meeting the talk of Julius Abeles of Leavenworth was thought most interesting. He described welfare and social reform work by the Leavenworth B'Nai B'Rith chapter among the Jews in the state and federal penitentiaries there. There are at present but three Jews in both institutions, he reported, none of them being from Kansas.

To Kansas City in 1934.

Following selection of Kansas City, Kansas, as the 1934 convention city, the delegates elected the following state officers: Dr. J. H. Rabin of Kansas City, Kansas, president; Emanuel Gerstenfeld of Wichita, first vice-president; Morris M. Levin of Leavenworth, second vice-president; A. H. Scrippski of Topeka, secretary; Myer Freshman of Parsons, treasurer.

The high point of the afternoon session was reached in the initiation of a class of candidates by the Wichita drill team, the American Legion room in Memorial hall being thrown open to a number of specially invited guests from the community, including several of the protestant ministers.

The ceremony was most impressive, depicting the tribulations of the race from old testament times down to the present liberty and social justice under the American flag.

HIS AID TO THE COURTS

JOSEPH COHEN, KANSAS LAWYER,
IN ACCORD WITH JUDGE HOPKINS.

Federal Jurist Praises the Stand
and Explains His Condemnation
of Perjury Was Entirely
General.

The indorsement by Joseph Cohen, Kansas City, Kansas, lawyer, of his plea to keep law suits free of perjury was complimented today by Judge Richard J. Hopkins of the Kansas federal court. Mr. Cohen, who prosecuted a damage suit as the result of an injury suffered by Miss Dorothy May Kidd when she fell on a street car, presented the testimony of a witness, Herman Curtis, who testified he saw the accident.

Attorneys for the Kansas City Public Service Company, defendant in the action, offered testimony to show that Curtis had been the claimant for damages or had filed suits against corporations and persons forty times, and that Curtis was not a witness to the accident.

It was after that testimony was produced that Judge Hopkins delivered a lecture condemning perjured testimony in the courts.

HIS PLEDGE TO ANY PROGRAM.

Mr. Cohen complimented Judge Hopkins on his remarks and pledged his support to any program that would uphold the dignity of the courts and explained that the witness who had appeared in his case had offered to testify in response to an advertisement asking for possible witnesses to the accident.

"I knew nothing of the claims of the other side that Curtis had filed the numerous claims against persons or corporations," Mr. Cohen said. "Those facts were not brought out when attorneys for both sides of the case examined Curtis in the taking of his deposition. Being unaware of the fact that the credulity of the witness had been challenged I presented his testimony in court as it was given to me.

"I heartily join with the views of the court that subornation of perjury is entirely too frequent in our courts and it is with pleasure that I pledge my undivided support to keep the courts clean of questionable testimony, wherever it may be found."

Mr. Cohen said he would refile the action in the case and present the evidence without Curtis as a witness.

NOT A SPECIFIC CONDEMNATION.

"The remarks of the court generally directed against subornation of perjury in the courts in no way were meant to reflect upon Mr. Cohen," Judge Hopkins said today.

"The response from Mr. Cohen, in view of the unfortunate circumstance, was indeed gratifying, and I wish to compliment him for his praiseworthy stand as a lawyer to co-operate with the court."

Judge Hopkins ordered an investigation into the testimony of the witness with the declaration that, if perjury had been committed prosecution follow.

COHEN TO VISIT OHIO LODGES

District President of B'nai B'rith to Complete Required Tour of Jurisdiction.

An official visit to the lodges in northwestern Ohio will be made beginning next week by Joseph Cohen, president of District Grand Lodge No. 2, of the B'nai B'rith. Cohen will be accompanied by his wife.

The tour is in conformity with a long-established custom of the B'nai B'rith grand lodge, which requires the head of the district to visit each of the sixty-seven lodges in the eight states under his jurisdiction sometime during his administration. President Cohen has already visited all of the lodges in his district with the exception of those in Ohio and Kentucky.

The first step in his itinerary will be next Tuesday at Marion, O. The next day he will visit Cleveland lodge and Balfour lodge in Cleveland, O., and next Thursday he will visit the lodge at Lorain, O., where his predecessor in office, Samuel Goldstein, resides. The balance of his itinerary is as follows: Toledo, January 7, Columbus, January 8, Canton, January 9, Mansfield, January 10, Youngstown, January 11, Warren, January 12, Steubenville, January 14, Bellaire, January 15 and Cleveland Heights, January 16.

Cohen holds the dual distinction of being the youngest man ever to occupy the presidency of the district grand lodge and the first person from the state of Kansas to be elected to that office.

COHEN A "ACKS WORLD THREATS TO DEMOCRACY

Free Press, Speech U. S.
Hope, B'Nai B'Rith
Head Says.

HITLER PERSECUTION CITED

Canton Jewish Organiza-
tion Installs Harry
Berger New President.

The world is farther from democracy today than before the World war, when America sent its youth to the front to make the world safe for democracy, Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Mo., national president of B'nai B'rith, told 200 members and guests at an installation meeting of the Canton organization in Jewish Community center Tuesday night.

As the result of the world's state of transition, it is possible that the United States may witness some surprising readjustments, but there is no great cause for alarm in this country as long as we maintain an uncensored press, the right to peaceful assembly and free speech, the speaker said.

His address followed a banquet and installation services for 67 new members, at which he presided. He was presented by Rabbi Charles B. Latz.

Attacks Three Regimes.

He asserted that the world is going through its "worst stages of democracy," assailing the regime of Hitler in Germany, Mussolini in Italy and Stalin in Russia.

"Often I have been asked if such things as have happened in Germany could happen in America. My answer is: 'I did not believe that it could happen in Germany.'"

He charged Hitler with sending representatives to United States, paid by the German government, to spread propaganda here against the Jews. He branded German exchange students as Nazis propagandists.

"I do not fear the effect of this propaganda upon the minds of the thinking, intelligent people of this country," he said. "It is the masses who need enlightenment on these anti-semitic preachings.

"One of the major organizations in this country spreading Nazi propaganda is the Silver Shirts. It is one of the deadliest of all groups against the Jew, both here and abroad, and is headed by a very clever psychologist and writer.

Conservating Policy.

"The Jews, especially B'Nai B'Rith, are active in attempting to spread the truth. Our organization has taken a conservative and dignified method in attempting to retaliate. We do this for the protection and safety of Jews in Germany, bearing in mind that we have 103 B'Nai B'Rith lodges, with 14,000 members, in Germany.

"Hitler, shortly after his rise to power, began to make advances to the Pope at the Vatican and later to Mussolini. Before he did, however, we had representatives call upon them and both voiced their disapproval of the way the Jews were oppressed in Germany."

Mr. Cohen told the local Jewish organization that there was no attempt being made by Jews, national or international, either to gain control of United States government, or control international politics or finance. He denied emphatically charges made against Jews by organizations in this country, which he said were organized specifically to undermine public opinion of the Jew.

"We don't want to be privileged, but we want, as Jews and American citizens, to exercise the same privileges others enjoy," Mr. Cohen concluded.

JEWISH LEADER SEES NEED FOR READJUSTMENT

B'Nai B'Rith President Talks to Mansfield Group; Officers Installed.

Declaring the world farther from democracy than before the World war, Joseph Cohen, Kansas City, Mo., district president of B'Nai B'Rith, speaking at an installation meeting in Mansfield Jewish temple last night, predicted surprising readjustments for the United States.

"Readjustments may be in store for the country as a result of the world's present state of transition," Cohen said, "but there should be no cause for alarm as long as the uncensored press, the right to peaceful assembly and free speech are maintained."

He denied emphatically charges made against Jews by certain organizations in the country, and that any attempt is being made by Jews, national or international, to gain control of any government or control international politics.

"Want Same Privileges."

"We don't want to be privileged, but we want, as Jews and American citizens, to exercise the same privileges others enjoy," Cohen said.

ACTIVITIES OF B'NAI B'RITH

In its protest against recent persecutions by the Hitler faction in Germany B'Nai B'Rith has not merely pleaded the cause of those of Jewish birth but has spoken for the rights of all minorities in Germany which have also suffered from tyranny and discrimination.

In its particular field of endeavor B'Nai B'Rith has fine opportunity for continued effective work along charitable and benevolent lines, as well as in its defense of the principles of human liberty.

Other activities of the order consist of the support and maintenance of Hillel Foundation chapter houses at eight universities.

B'nai B'rith Leader Sees

Declares Free Speech, Press and Assembly
Are Safeguards—Lauds Local Groups

"I have no fear for the rights of the Jewish people in this country as long as we have free speech, free press and the right to assemble, and the truth regarding any allegation is allowed," Joseph Cohen, of Kansas City, Kan., president of the B'nai B'rith lodge district No. 2, told nearly 200 guests last night at the 51st anniversary banquet of Mahoning Lodge No. 339, at Anshe Emeth Temple.

Cohen, a leader of the midwest Jewry, said he does not fear the right-thinking and intelligent mind of the non-Jewish world regarding certain charges now being made against the Jews, but does fear the result of the "poisonous propaganda" being spread by Hitler supporters in this country. He said German students came to this country and be-

gan to denounce the Jew in Germany until the government called a halt.

Cohen praised the anti-defamation bureau of the B'nai B'rith for its service in curbing the false statements of anti-Jewish publications.

Cohen named a dozen publications, headed by the "Order of Silver Shirts," which he charged, have spread "religiously prejudiced and falsifying" against the Jews. He said whenever a supposed Hitlerite spoke against the Jew, one of the 2,000 B'nai B'rith speakers would answer.

The speaker cited the German Jews' contribution to art, literature and music, saying: "As a reward, they were trampled upon by Hitler.

"Even Mussolini and the Pope protested against the discrimination," he said.

"I was asked once by a friend if I believed the Jew's condition in Germany could exist in America," Cohen said. "I answered: 'Today we may be safe, but with our constantly changing civilization and government, we cannot predict.'

"Stand as a Body"

Cohen attacked Jews who do not ally themselves with any Jewish temple, synagogue or Jewish organization, many of whom do not want it known that they are Jews.

"The Jewry of America should stand as a body against its enemies, and not as organizations. The B'nai B'rith was the only Jewish unit that got as far as to see Secretary of State Hull. Other bodies only got as far as assistant secretaries.

"We are constantly on the alert for any anti-Jewish movements in this or any other country through B'nai B'rith mediums, which I am not revealing at this time. The lodge is ever fighting for the rights of Jews," Cohen said.

Work of B'nai B'rith in 90 Years Outlined at Open Meeting Here

When Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, president of District Grand Lodge No. 2, B'nai B'rith, spoke at an open meeting of the Bellaire lodge last night, he outlined in part some of the great work of this organization, which was formed 90 years ago.

He first told of the arrival of a band of Jewish people back in the 17th century, who came to America just as did the Pilgrim fathers, seeking religious liberty and of their growth to a population of 4,000,000 in the United States.

The service that has been rendered to this country on the fields of battle, in the halls of learning, in governmental circles, in business and in industry also was discussed as he told of the desire of the people to be a part of this great country, where humanitarian rules prevail.

In this connection, President Cohen told of the inroads being made by Hitlerism, of the "silver shires" and other Nazi organizations that are at work in the United States undermining the thoughts of the American people against the Jews.

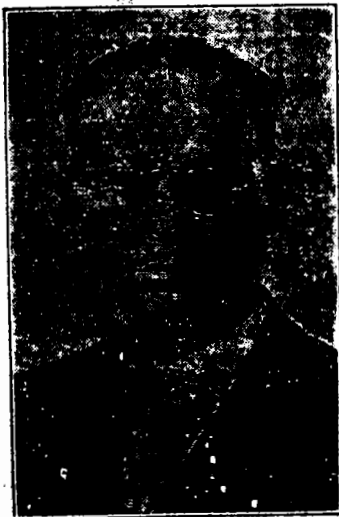
The speaker commended the American Federation of Labor and the American Legion on their stand, taken against the German government, because of the mistreatment of the Jews in Germany.

Work of the B'nai B'rith in supporting the Cleveland Orphans home, which houses thousands of children, and also the support of the various hospitals that are combatting tuberculosis was stressed as was the fact that the institutions, although Jewish supported, take in non-Jewish patients. The work of the Hillel Foundation, which is carried out at some of the largest universities in the country, was explained.

The meeting last night was held at the Sons of Israel temple, where quite a large number were in attendance. Mr. Cohen was accompanied here by his wife and prior to the meeting at the temple, an informal dinner, for some of the officers and guests, was held at the Elks' club.

Prior to the general meeting, Max Duga, president, and his aides, the new officers for 1934, were installed by Past President Louis M. Duga.

JEWISH LEADER SEES NEED FOR READJUSTMENT

B'Nai B'Rith President Talks to Mansfield Group; Officers Installed.

Declaring the world farther from democracy than before the World war, Joseph Cohen, Kansas City, Mo., district president of B'nai B'rith, speaking at an installation meeting in Mansfield Jewish temple last night, predicted surprising readjustments for the United States.

"Readjustments may be in store for the country as a result of the world's present state of transition," Cohen said, "but there should be no cause for alarm as long as he uncensored press, the right to peaceful assembly and free speech are maintained."

He denied emphatically charges made against Jews by certain organizations in the country, and that any attempt is being made by Jews, national or international, to gain control of any government or control international politics.

"Want Same Privileges."

"We don't want to be privileged, but we want, as Jews and American citizens, to exercise the same privileges others enjoy," Cohen said.

His address followed installation ceremonies of Freundlich lodge during which the following took office: Howard L. Chernoff, president; Sam Schweitzer, vice president; A. Lerner, warden; Victor Kevey, guardian; Dr. H. D. Smith, secretary; J. M. Cousins, treasurer; and J. J. Freundlich, monitor.

In his discussion on world conditions, Cohen said the world is passing through its "worst stages of democracy," assailing the regimes of Hitler in Germany, Mussolini in Italy, and Stalin in Russia.

ACTIVITIES OF B'NAI B'RITH

The visit to Mansfield last evening of Joseph Cohen, of Kansas City, district grand lodge president of B'nai B'rith, coupled with installation of new officers of the Louis Freundlich local lodge, may well be made the occasion for mention of the effective public service of this active and influential Jewish fraternal order.

This order, which is now observing its ninetieth anniversary, has among its objects the support of a number of orphans' homes, institutions for the aged, hospitals, relief of refugees, support of Hillel Foundation houses at eight large universities, and the advancement of citizenship and Americanization.

In addition to its work in behalf of these causes it has been the consistent effort of B'nai B'rith to bring about a better understanding between Jews and Gentiles.

In its protest against recent persecutions by the Hitler faction in Germany B'nai B'rith has not merely pleaded the cause of those of Jewish birth but has spoken for the rights of all minorities in Germany which have also suffered from tyranny and discrimination.

In its particular field of endeavor B'nai B'rith has fine opportunity for continued effective work along charitable and benevolent lines, as well as in its defense of the principles of human liberty.

COHEN ATTACKS WORLD THREATS TO DEMOCRACY

Free Press, Speech U. S.
Hope, B'Nai B'Rith
Head Says.

The world is farther from democracy today than before the World war, when America sent its youth to the front to make the world safe for democracy, Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Mo., national president of B'Nai B'Rith, told 200 members and guests at an installation meeting of the Canton organization in Jewish Community center Tuesday night.

As the result of the world's state of transition, it is possible that the United States may witness some surprising readjustments, but there is no great cause for alarm in this country as long as we maintain an uncensored press, the right to peaceful assembly and free speech, the speaker said.

His address followed a banquet and installation services for 67 new members, at which he presided. He was presented by Rabbi Charles B. Latz.

Attacks Three Regimes.

He asserted that the world is going through its "worst stages of democracy," assailing the regime of Hitler in Germany, Mussolini in Italy and Stalin in Russia.

"Often I have been asked if such things as have happened in Germany could happen in America. My answer is: 'I did not believe that it could happen in Germany.'"

He charged Hitler with sending representatives to United States, paid by the German government, to spread propaganda here against the Jews. He branded German exchange students as Nazis propagandists.

"I do not fear the effect of this propaganda upon the minds of the thinking, intelligent people of this country," he said. "It is the masses who need enlightenment on these anti-semitic preachings.

"One of the major organizations in this country spreading Nazi propaganda is the Silver Shirts. It is one of the deadliest of all groups against the Jew, both here and abroad, and is headed by a very clever psychologist and writer.

Conservating Policy.

"The Jews, especially B'Nai B'Rith, are active in attempting to spread the truth. Our organization has taken a conservative and dignified method in attempting to retaliate. We do this for the protection and safety of Jews in Germany, bearing in mind that we have 103 B'Nai B'Rith lodges, with 14,000 members, in this country.

"Hitler, shortly after his rise to

wer, began to make advances to Pope at the Vatican and later Mussolini. Before he did, however, we had representatives call on them and both voiced their approval of the way the Jews were oppressed in Germany."

Mr. Cohen told the local Jewish organization that there was no attempt being made by Jews, national, international, either to gain control of United States government, or international politics or finance. He denied emphatically charges made against Jews by organizations in this country, which he said were organized specifically to undermine public opinion of the Jew.

"We don't want to be privileged, but we want, as Jews and American citizens, to exercise the same privileges others enjoy," Mr. Cohen concluded.

Reproves K.C. for Neglect of Anti-Defamation League

Addressing the B'nai B'rith meeting here Monday night, Joseph Cohen, president of District Grand Lodge No. 2, voiced his disappointment that Kansas City had not formed one of the anti-defamation councils through which chapters all over the country are fighting off the poisons of Nazi

propaganda. Mr. Cohen's subject was "B'nai B'rith Meets the Challenge." His text was largely an explanation of the activities and manner of operation of the anti-defamation league of the B'nai B'rith.

Enlightening to those of the audience who knew the league by name only, Mr. Cohen's talk, vigorously and crisply delivered, found avid listeners, also, in the B'nai B'rith members who were better informed. The anti-defamation league, as Mr. Cohen explained, has been thwarting anti-Semitism and discriminations against the Jews by appealing to the proper authorities, by contacts in universities, by informative literature, by placing counteracting books in public libraries.

Throughout the country, local councils are dealing with their own problems in co-operation with the national anti-defamation league of the B'nai B'rith.

Grasping every chance to erect its educational bulwarks, the latest suggestion of the league to the U. S. chapters is the distribution of a hundred copies each month for three months of the new periodical "Today." Its editor is Prof. Raymond Moley, former "brain-truster." The March issue began a series of three articles under the heading of "Hitlerism Invades America."

The Kansas City chapter has ordered its copies which will be circulated throughout the community, reaching both Jew and non-Jew. The March article explained the basic differences between Naziism and Americanism. The April article probes into Silver Shirt machinations and into the strongarming by means of which Nazi organizations are taking over established German-American societies.

Preceding Mr. Cohen's talk, a trio presented a musical program. Members were Thusnelda Bircsak, pianist; Norma Troje Miller, violinist, and Dorothy Munday, cellist.

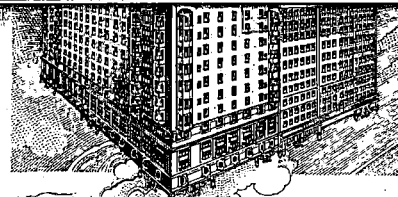

Jewish Leader Denies Landon Is Anti-Semitic

Harzfeld, Zionist, Asserts Only Basis for Charge Is Letter by Democrat

Governor Ousted Kansan

Broadcast Cites Nominee's Views on Racial Issue

Jacob A. Harzfeld, of Kansas City, spoke over WINS last night, defending Governor Alfred M. Landon of Kansas, Republican Presidential candidate, against an alleged whispering campaign accusing him of anti-Semitism. Mr. Harzfeld, long a friend of Governor Landon, is the organizer of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Kansas City, is a Zionist leader, and, with Louis Marshall and Judge Morris Stern, drafted the constitution of the Jewish Agency of Palestine.

"There has been," said Mr. Harzfeld, "an active campaign made, attempting to impute to Governor Landon anti-Semitic feeling. The basis of this false allegation, and the only basis, has been a letter that was written by Dr. Carmichael, formerly a superintendent of the State Hospital for the Insane in Kansas. In Kansas, in each state hospital and many other state institutions, Governor Landon, by the law of the state and by virtue of his office, is the chairman of the board of trustees. This Dr. Carmichael had been in charge of the hospital for the last twenty years. Carmichael is a Southern Democrat. As superintendent he wrote a letter to several medical schools stating that there was an opening for the appointment of an interne in the hospital, but, he stated, 'All applicants must be Gentiles.'"

"Of course, neither Governor Landon nor any other member of the board knew about the letter, nor did they ever hear about it until Joseph Cohen, a lawyer from Kansas City, Kan., and a friend of the Governor and a friend of mine, called his attention to it. Landon was furious, and Dr. Carmichael was at once discharged. Somehow or other a facsimile copy of Carmichael's letter was secured and printed in a large number of newspapers and magazines, and the letter appeared thus in facsimile in reputable and disreputable papers throughout the land.

"In no instance did the news article state that Carmichael was a Democrat appointed by a Democrat, and held office for twenty years prior to Landon's election. In no instance did the papers state that Governor Landon and the other members of the board had no knowledge that any such letter had been written. The imputation these papers desired to convey was that Governor Landon connived at the writing of this letter."

Mr. Harzfeld said that Governor Landon had taken an important part in William Allen White's campaign against the Ku-Klux Klan in 1924. Any Kansan familiar with his record, continued Mr. Harzfeld, would know that the charge of anti-Semitism was absurd. Recently, he said, Governor Landon had spoken his mind about groups which tried to exploit prejudices.

"I have no use," he quoted Governor Landon as saying, "for any elements who are endeavoring to bring racial prejudices and religious bigotries into American life and state frankly that I disclaim the support of any such organizations or groups."

"Both candidates of the major parties are free from anti-Semitism and other prejudices based on race and religion. Jews and gentiles alike should choose their candidates on the basis of the candidates' stand on the great national issues confronting this nation at this time.

"The record of Governor Landon is proof of the fair-minded and liberal attitude which he has always maintained—that of a wholesome respect and understanding of the peoples of all races and creeds."

AN EDUCATOR CALLS.

Among those who chatted with Landon today was Miss Agnes Samuelson of Des Moines, vice-president of the National Education Association.

"I have always been especially interested in rural education and was pleased to find that Kansas, like Iowa, takes a great deal of pride in her rural schools," Miss Samuelson told reporters.

"I found the governor's interest in rural schools was splendid.

"Governor Landon apparently believes, as we do, in equal opportunity and education for all. He wants the rural schools in Kansas improved."

LANDON FAIR TO JEWS

JOSEPH COHEN PROVES A CHARGE IS UNFOUNDED.

The Governor Supported William Allen White Against Klan and Did Not Permit Discrimination in His Administration.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23. — Joseph Cohen of Kansas City, Kansas, member of the board of governors of Greater Kansas City Jewish Welfare Federation, in a radio speech tonight, answered the "malicious whispering campaign" that Governor Landon is anti-Semitic.

Mr. Cohen traced the source of these whisperings, which have been used by the new dealers to line up Jewish votes for President Roosevelt in the large cities, and showed that they were unfounded. He declared that the Republican nominee had a clear-cut record in Kansas as an opponent of the Ku Klux Klan.

Mr. Cohen said he believed he was safe in saying there was not a Jew in Kansas "who honestly believes that his governor is anti-Semitic."

"This campaign against Governor Landon," he said, "is founded on an incident that occurred last spring when the superintendent of the state hospital for the insane at Osawatomie, Dr. Carmichael, sent a letter to the dean of the medical school of the University of Minnesota, stating that there was a staff position in neuropsychiatry open, but that all applicants must be gentiles."

LANDON ORDERS INVESTIGATION.

"This letter of Dr. Carmichael's was first called to my attention by the anti-defamation league of the B'nai B'rith and I immediately took the matter up with Governor Landon and Dr. Scott, vice-chairman of the board of administration. Governor Landon immediately responded to my letter stating that it was the first he had known about it and advising me that he was turning it over to the state board of administration for immediate attention.

"An investigation was started by the state board of administration and the attorney general's office of the administration of the hospital affairs by Dr. Carmichael, resulting in a request for and the acceptance of the resignation of Dr. Carmichael.

"Since Dr. Carmichael's resignation, a Jewish physician by the name of Dr. John Russell has been given a position on the staff at the state hospital at Osawatomie. It is strikingly peculiar how often facsimiles of the Carmichael letter have been published without giving the true facts concerning the same.

Governor Landon is not just an opportunistic friend of minority groups. Long before he ran for the governorship of Kansas, he demonstrated his courage and adherence to traditional American thought on the question of race and religion. In 1924 the Ku Klux Klan was at the height of its political strength in Kansas and boasted that it had captured both candidates for governor of Kansas on the Republican and Democratic tickets.

WHEN WHITE FOUGHT KLAN.

William Allen White of Emporia endeavored to get the gubernatorial candidates of these parties to come out for the right and denounce the klan. Failing in his efforts to do so, he announced on an independent ticket for the governorship and ran for that office on the sole and only issue of 'out with the klan.' Southeastern Kansas, and particularly Montgomery County where Alf Landon lived, was a hot-bed for the klan. Mr. White received a letter from a Jewish clothing merchant in Alfred Landon's home county in which the merchant said that his store was being boycotted, his wife was being snubbed and his whole life was being made unhappy.

You spoke of a Jewish doctor who was appointed to a position in the State Insane Hospital at Osawatomie. What has been Governor Landon's general policy in such matters?

MR. COHEN: In many ways Alfred Landon has demonstrated that he does not judge men or women on the basis of race, religion or creed. During his first administration as Governor of Kansas, one of the secretaries in his office was a young woman named Leah Ulamperl, a Topeka Jewess, who later became private secretary to Federal Judge Richard J. Hopkins of Kansas. There are a number of Jews holding responsible positions in state institutions in Kansas who have been appointed to such positions not because they are Jewish, but because they happened to better measure up to the requirements of those particular positions than the other applicants. But let me tell you something of much more importance than any individual instances. Early in Governor Landon's first term as governor, he ordered the State Board of Administration to eliminate from the application blanks for employment in the state institutions any reference whatsoever to the religion or race of the applicant.

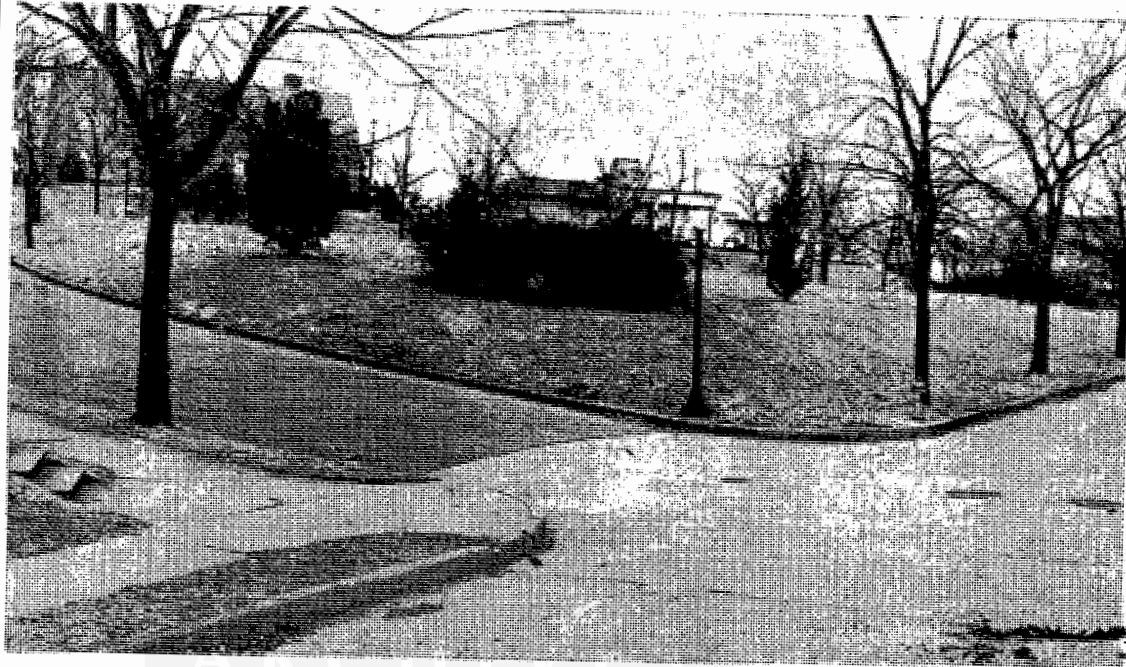

High Court Upholds Award of Damages to Huron Claggett

The state supreme court yesterday ruled that the Phillips Petroleum company should pay damages amounting to \$15,666 to Huron Claggett, 419 Freeman avenue, a Negro, for injuries suffered when he was struck by a truck of that company on December 7, 1935. In rendering the decision written by Justice Hugo T. Wedell, the supreme court upheld the verdict handed down in Judge Willard Benton's second division of the district court. Joseph Cohen was lawyer for the plaintiff.

Claggett was struck by a Phil-

lips' truck driven by Frank Fisher as he was crossing Third street at New Jersey avenue. He was in the hospital five months and was totally disabled, according to Cohen.

DAMAGE AWARD IS UPHELD.

Kansas Supreme Court Affirms \$15,666 for Injured Negro.

After nearly four years of litigation, the Kansas Supreme court yesterday affirmed a verdict for \$15,666 in damages to Huron Claggett, Negro, 36 years old, 419 Freeman avenue, Kansas City, Kansas. The award was for injuries received December 7, 1935, when he was struck by a northbound truck of the Phillips Petroleum company, at Third street and New Jersey avenue, Kansas City, Kansas. His attorney, Joseph Cohen, told the court Claggett received permanent disability from a fractured skull, loss of one eye and one ear, a shortening of one leg and a curvature of the spine.

a fund-raising body, campaigning for and distributing funds for Jewish needs, the Federation could not act on these matters. The Community Council arose out of the recognition of the need for an inter-group organization to consider such disputes, to integrate Jewish opinion on current problems and to act in defense of Jewish civil and religious rights at such times as they are threatened.

"It is the hope of the organizers of the Community Council of Greater Kansas City," said Mr. Cohen this week, "that it will ultimately speak and act on behalf of all the Jewish people in this community. In these trying times it is too dangerous and costly for us to have discord and disunion among our co-religionists. If we are to safeguard our civil and religious rights we must have unity within our ranks."

The preamble of the Council's constitution carries forward this idea, in stating its goals:

"... To coordinate the various factors in Jewish life, to preserve the dignity and integrity of the Jewish people, to defend and protect the civil, constitutional and religious rights of all people, wherever such rights are placed in jeopardy; to promote the cultural, philanthropic and spiritual aspirations of the Jewish community, and to cooperate with other agencies having similar or related purposes."

Quarterly Meetings

The Council will meet only four times a year, in February, May, September and December, unless special meetings are called. The executive committee, however, will meet every month.

"We earnestly solicit the Jewry of Kansas City," states President Cohen, "to submit to the Council those matters which should be handled by a group such as ours instead of en-

organization of the Jewish Community Council of Greater Kansas City, a unifying body for local Jewry, was concluded here on March 30 with election of officers. It is regarded as an important step for the community since it brings together, for purposes of coordination and communal expression, the majority of local Jewish organizations.

Mr. Cohen was elected president of the community organization at the March 30th meeting. Other officers are:

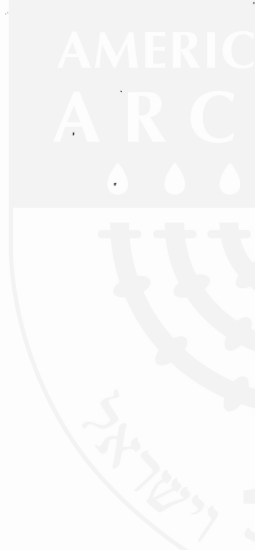

IN AND AROUND THE COURTHOUSE

Continuing the Series of Thumbnail Sketches of Reporters Who Have
Handled Court House News—Success Stories This Time?

Editor's Note—In previous articles the court house columnist has told stories that figured in the careers of former court house reporters. In today's columns he tells of persons who found an antidote for printer's ink and branched into other fields.

Howard Payne, city clerk of Kansas City, Kansas, with a record of official duty that ranks with any in the Southwest, was a reporter for the old Journal. Among his associates of the early journalism days in this city Howard still ranks as one of the most capable newspaper men that ever covered a story here.

In a trial in district court several years ago Al Herrod referred to Howard as "the perennial city clerk." It is probable that he can hold that important post as long as he desires. His ability would win him a high position with a private concern. But printer's ink still flows in his veins and if he ever leaves his present position, the newspaper offices will welcome him again.

Sixteen years ago a brand new shingle decorated a local law office. It read: "Joseph Cohen," attorney at law. From the beginning the young attorney was successful. He seemed to have more poise in the court room than the average beginner, a better knowledge of court room procedure. There was a reason—

Joseph Cohen, attorney, until a week preceding his entrance into the legal field was "Joseph Cohen, court

house reporter for The Star." While covering the building daily, he attended law schools nights and the University of Colorado during summer vacations.

The Star demands accuracy of its men and Joe Cohen was one of its most accurate news gatherers. It was there he acquired his fidelity for detail, a quality that has played a major part in his successful legal career.

Frank M. Holcomb, chairman of the board of county commissioners, once entertained an ambition to be a newspaperman. He worked for a short time on the old Gazette-Globe but progress was slow and wages small, so he entered the banking field. He never has regretted his decision.

Gerald Breightm, author of short stories for boys and Hollywood scenario writer, began his newspaper career in Kansas City, Kansas. In New York he works at the cable desk of the Associated Press. John H. Martin remembers his early newspaper work in Kansas City, Kansas. The Mendenhall murder case was the first big story he covered.

Darrell (Doc) Hartley, Starbeams editor of The Star, began his newspaper career in Kansas City, Kansas. Charley Bhod, who retired as city editor of The Times, several years ago, was a reporter here in the Perl Morgan-Jake Frohwerk days.

A BIG CROP OF JUDGES.

Joseph Cohen, Lawyer, Holds Police Court Title Today.

The Kansas City, Kansas, "Municipal School for Judges" graduated another member of the bench today in the person of Joseph Cohen, lawyer. The school, of which Mayor McCombs is "dean," has been graduating one student daily, its present alumni consisting of Joseph A. Lynch and Harry Hayward. Each graduate, under the unwritten code of legal procedure, is entitled to be called "judge," and to wear such distinctive robes of office as his fancy and his ability to stand the "kidding" of his associates may dictate.

With 112 more members of the Wyandotte County Bar association still available for the school, the mayor feels that he need be in no hurry to make up his mind about a permanent successor to Judge Lee Judy, whose resignation as judge of Kansas City, Kansas, police court became effective June 1.

Enrollment in the course is a simple matter. It can be done in person, or the student may "suggest" through a friend that he has forty-five minutes available in which to take the course.

A reasonable familiarity with the wording of the oath, though not obligatory, is desirable as an entrance requirement.

FIX DRAFT ORDER

Registrants Here Show Little Excitement as Numbers Are Drawn in Capital.

ONE YOUTH IN FIRST 12

Other Holders of Early Numbers in Wyandotte County Are Above 35.

MANY WILL BE DEFERRED

Dependents Account for Lack of Interest in Proceedings Among Older Men.

Kansas City took the nation's third national draft lottery in seventeen months pretty much in stride last night.

Almost 9,500 men in Wyandotte County were affected by the drawing of number capsules from the fish bowl in Washington, but fewer than half of them had learned their serial numbers from their respective selective service boards. Many telephone calls were received yesterday at the board offices by men wanting to know their numbers, but there was none of the rush that went with the first and second lotteries.

Few to Be Called Soon.

As one board official explained it most of the men in the present lottery are over 35 years old, have several dependents and know that they will not be called for military service soon.

Of the first twelve men listed by the Wyandotte County draft boards whose numbers were drawn last night, only one was a 20-year-old. He was Robert O. Forsberg, 832 South Eighth street, the son of a Kansas City, Kansas, police sergeant.

Forsberg, holding serial No. 1,103 did not know he had drawn order No. 2 in board No. 4 until the end of his shift at 1:12 o'clock this morning in the North American aviation plant where he is an assembly worker. Although his parents, Sergt. and Mrs. Oscar Forsberg, had been listening on the radio at their home, they did not hear No. 1,103 called. The youth is a former student at Wyandotte, Central junior and Morse schools.

Serial No. 411 Is First.

Order No. 1 in each of the five boards went to holders of serial No. 411, the fourth number drawn in Washington. The five men all are in the age group above 35 and most all have dependents. The second number drawn affecting Wyandotte County was 1,817 and it applied only to boards No. 1 and No. 5. The third number, 1,103, applied to all five.

Virtually all the first twelve men expressed their patriotism in a manner similar to the Rev. Thomas Lewis Pleas, 1118 North Twelfth street, 39-year-old Negro pastor of the Church of God in Christ, Twelfth street and Ann avenue. Informed that he had drawn order No. 1 in draft board No. 1, Pleas said simply: "Here I am. I'm ready when they want me."

The minister has three children, ages 2, 4 and 8.

Holders of order No. 2 in draft board No. 1 was Joseph Cohen, lawyer, living at 2208 Washington boulevard. He also has three children, ages 11, 7 and 5.

In Previous War's Draft.

Cohen had serial number 1,817. The only other man to hold that number in the county was Frank B. Allen, 42-year-old custodian of the Attucks school, holder of order No. 2 in board No. 5. He said that he had registered for the draft in 1918 and was scheduled to leave his home at Wichita for camp at 11 o'clock the night after the Armistice was declared. He is married, has children 10, 7 and 5 years old, and lives at 4130 Fisher street.

Order No. 1 in board No. 2 is held by Russell Knapp, 49-year-old cleaner's spotter who lives at 816 Ann avenue with his wife and two children, 8 and 5. Order No. 2 in that board went to Kirk B. Kastner, 43-year-old restaurant proprietor, living at 855 Minnesota avenue.

"I've beaten them to the punch," Kastner said. "Already I have asked to enter the service. I have sent an application into Washington."

Kastner enlisted and served two years with an ammunition train in the first World war. He is married.

A Son in Service.

Holder of order No. 1 in board No. 3 is Louis David Prunty, 38, of 733 Ohio avenue, a car inspector for the Union Pacific railroad for the last twenty-two years. Married, he has three children. A 17-year-old son, Louis C. Prunty, is a member of a tank destroying battalion. Having order No. 2 in that board is Joseph Peter Elmer, 40, a barber in the Brotherhood block. He is married, has a year-old child, and lives at 58 North Twelfth street.

MORE WAR NEWS

Information on Progress of Fighting and Production to Be Published.

NO FACTS FOR ENEMY

Statements That Might Prove of Military Aid Still Will Be Withheld.

LIFT CASUALTY LIST BAN

Publication Locally Is Sanctioned Under Policy Set Up by New Board.

(By The Star's Correspondent.)

Washington, March 17.—The public was assured today that all information on the progress of the war and production would be published whether "good or bad, cheerful or depressing," including casualty lists, and excepting only such facts that might prove of aid to the enemy.

To meet the increasing volume of criticism over press and radio censorship, and the policy of withholding information at the source, the Committee on War Information, headed by Archibald MacLeish, sought in a formal statement to lay down well defined rules under which war information would be given the public. An innovation to be introduced will be a joint statement at intervals by the chiefs of staffs of the army and navy reviewing the military situation in various theaters of war.

The publication locally of casualty lists, which was shut off soon after Pearl Harbor, will be resumed, but nation-wide roundups of names by newspapers and the radio, ranks and ratings of navy officers and personnel and designation of units to which army officers and men have been assigned will be forbidden.

Board Establishes Policy.

The statement of war information policy came from a board on which the army, navy, State department and numerous government agencies are represented, but did not include members of the office of censorship headed by Byron Price. The plan was worked out by officials controlling the sources of information. They have been the ones, especially the army and navy, who have been charged with withholding the bad news, and creating a confusing picture of the progress of the war.

The Committee on War Information, in defending the government censorship policies, said they were based "upon the firm conviction that the people of a democracy are entitled to know the facts, whether they are good or bad, cheerful or depressing."

"On the other hand," it added, "our people will willingly forego knowledge of those facts whose revelation will help the enemy to harm us. . . . Under no circumstances does the government publish information which is known to be untrue. Under no circumstances does the government withhold news from publication on the ground that the news is bad or depressing. When news is deliberately withheld, it is withheld for reasons of military security."

Plane losses in the air will be made public, the committee said, when the losses are obvious to the enemy, but plane losses on the ground will be withheld as long as the information is of value to the enemy. In no case will untrue information be made public concerning the effects of enemy bombings, it was asserted.

Some News in Installments.

"Statements may, however, be incomplete for reasons given," it was added. "Such statements will be completed as soon as this can be done without aiding the enemy."

Information concerning location of war industries and military installations has been discontinued, it was said, because of the aid it would give enemy spies and saboteurs.

Among other policies enumerated was to release information on damage to warships in battles at sea, when such damage incurred in the sight of the enemy. Destruction of enemy submarines will be kept secret for a considerable time, it was said, principally because of the effect it will have on enemy morale. Movements of troops and ships will continue to be taboo.

Australia Says Appointment of American Is Best News of the War.

SAYRE ON WAY HOME

High Commissioner to Philippines Has Arrived Safely in Honolulu.

(By the Associated Press.)

The transfer of General Douglas MacArthur—MacArthur of the Meuse-Argonne, Manila and Bataan—to supreme command in Australia and the Southwest Pacific lifted the heart of the Allied world as though a great battle had been fought and won.

For while no single position had been wrested from the Pacific invader, no single line had been forced back in his pattern of conquest, it appeared that some impalpable force was felt among three-quarters of the human race as once it was felt by the men before Vicksburg at sight of the slouched figure of old U. S. Grant, felt by the shouting buckaroos when Jeb Stuart rode tearing by, trailing his invisible plumes.

MacArthur in command for the last stand in the South Pacific; MacArthur standing at the bridge between the Pacific and Indian oceans to fight for the last pioneer on the English-speaking peoples, an "considerable numbers" of American ground and air troops there to help him—these were the greatest military data of the day.

Hit Bataan Line Anew.

Action at arms was meantime generally light in the Pacific, although the announcement of MacArthur's shift in headquarters was followed by a disclosure of renewed Japanese attacks on the Bataan line.

The Japanese attacks were "easily repulsed" by Maj. Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright's troops, a War department communique reported, and a bombardment of harbor defenses by enemy batteries on the Cavite shore of Manila bay caused only slight damage. A Japanese destroyer shelled the port of Cebu, but caused no damage.

The Australian press hailed General MacArthur's arrival as the most important and most welcome move yet made by the Allies for defense of the commonwealth bastion.

Aussies Love a Fighter.

"It will be regarded as the best single piece of news since the outbreak of the Pacific war," said one editorial. "His gallant stand in the Philippines has fired the imagination of Australians, who love a fighter, and his command of Australians in addition to American troops will be an inspiration to the fighting forces."

The selection of such a high United States officer for the important post, it was pointed out, gives emphasis to the statement by Secretary Stimson that "considerable" American forces are in Australia.

"It is also an indication," the newspaper added, "of President Roosevelt's realization of how important is the Southwest Pacific in this global war and of what aid the administration intends to pour into Australia."

"The appointment of MacArthur always has been warmly advocated and Prime Minister Curtin again has read the wishes of the people correctly in urging MacArthur's transfer to Australia."

Outlines His Jurisdiction.

Discussing the MacArthur move at a press conference, President Roosevelt said the general would have command of all United Nations land, naval and air forces in the area this side of Singapore. Thus his jurisdiction will not overlap that of General Sir Archibald Wavell, formerly Southwest Pacific commander, but now commander in India and Burma.

Mr. Roosevelt declared that the Axis short wave propagandists would try to make capital out of MacArthur's transfer by picturing it as abandonment of the Philippines.

The President said he made the decision to transfer MacArthur because the general could best serve his country in Australia.

Country Behind Him.

His remarks at his press conference later were issued by the White House as a formal statement. The President said:

"I know that every man and woman in the United States admires"

I know that the many thousands of B'nai B'rith workers in Greater Kansas City, will respond to his leadership with a spirit that has never been displayed before. We must do it! With other Jews in the community equally inspired and motivated by the same impulses as Mr. Cohen we will bring credit and commendation to every person in the Greater Kansas City area."

A house to house and industry by industry canvass is under consideration by the advisory committee as the best means of making a 100 per cent coverage of every bond prospect.

George L. Goldman, chairman of the entertainment committee for the War Bond Auction, January 19, will announce soon the names of the nationally known personalities who will be Kansas City's guests the night of the auction at the Municipal Arena.

Mr. Cohen, one of Kansas City's most active communal leaders, president of the Greater Kansas City Jewish Community Council and a past president of the B'nai B'rith District Grand Lodge, No. 2, was one of the original sponsors of the campaign. With Mr. Greenberg, chairman, the executive committee expressed the thought that the million-dollar war bond campaign would be headed by two of the most active men in the community, both possessed of energy and zeal that would insure the success of almost any undertaking.

The campaign, still in its formative period, was actively proceeding during the past week with the announcement that several surprising sales of war bonds, in denominations of \$5,000.00 and \$10,000.00 were made to individuals who were not classified in this high amount bracket.

The chairman of the men's division and the chairman of the women's division are expected to be announced in the very near future. The A. Z. A. chapters are also appointing committees to devote the entire energies and resources to their particular phase of the campaign.

"If there is one campaign in which the Jewish community and the general public must and will cooperate it is this bond selling event," said Mr. Cohen. "If ever there was a time for the patriotic expression of Americans of all classes—and our Jewish community especially—it is now. What with our men in the military forces giving their lives, for the preservation of freedom for those of us that are living under comparative peace and security, it is little enough to expect us to put the limit of our finances into sources that will give the armed forces the supplies for a speedy victory.

"I expect every Jew in the community to give everything in the way of cooperation and active support to this expression. With the right kind of cooperation we can oversubscribe the goal of one million dollars, several times over."

General Chairman Greenberg, when notified of Mr. Cohen's acceptance of the co-chairmanship made the following statement: "I feel gratified indeed that Joseph Cohen has accepted this great task. It is not going to be an easy one. Greater Kansas City to Have 4 Delegates at American Jewish Conference

Jacob Brown, Irvin Fane and Mrs. Ernest Peiser to Represent Kansas City, Mo.; Joseph Cohen is Unanimous Choice of State of Kansas—Jewish Community Displays Keen Interest in Forthcoming Meeting for World Jewry

Four citizens of the Jewish Community of Greater Kansas City will attend the American Jewish Conference as official delegates.

The Jewish Community of Kansas City, Mo., demonstrated how deeply all groups are impressed with the importance of the forthcoming American Jewish Conference last Tuesday night, June 15th, at the meeting of the Election Conference.

One hundred and seventy-three, out of one hundred and eighty-one, certified delegates, representing fifty-three organizations, met to elect the three Kansas Citizens to represent this Community. This attendance record was unprecedented and exceeded all expectations.

The Election Conference met at the Jewish Community Center. Louis H. Ehrlich was elected Chairman, and Harry Sheskin, Secretary. There were only five names on the final ballot, all other nominees having withdrawn from the contest. The delegates elected to represent Kansas City, Mo., are (in alphabetical order)

Mrs. Ernest E. Peiser.

Mr. Jacob Brown, whose father, the late Mr. Meyer Brown, was a well known leader in local Zionist activities for many years, was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1933 and is a practicing attorney. He has been active in Jewish communal life for the past decade. In 1929, he was chosen National Secretary of the A.Z.A., and in 1942, president of Kansas City Lodge, B'nai B'rith. Mr. Brown has been active in Zionist affairs for a number of years.

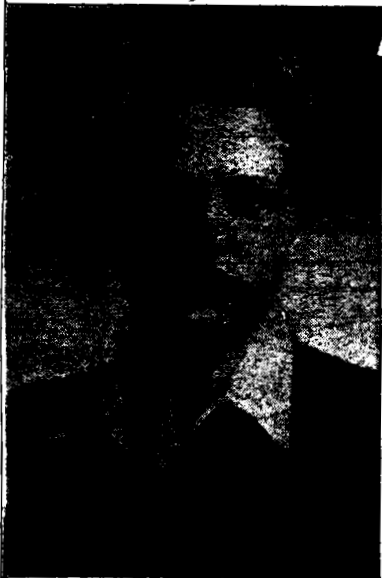
Mr. Irvin Fane received his law degree from the University of Missouri, and is a senior partner of the law firm of Johnson, Lucas, Graves and Fane. He is a member of various professional organizations and President of The Chancery, an association of younger lawyers. Mr. Fane, too, has been active in Jewish communal life for over a decade; he has served as vice-president both of the Jewish Community Council and Jewish Community Center; president of the Temple Brotherhood; and since

Council, and other civic organizations. She is also a member of the National Executive Board of Hadassah, and presides over the Kansas City Zionist Council. Mrs. Peiser has gained a wide reputation as a spirited and well informed speaker on Palestine, which she visited in 1937.

Mr. Joseph Cohen was the unanimous choice of all the Jewish organi-

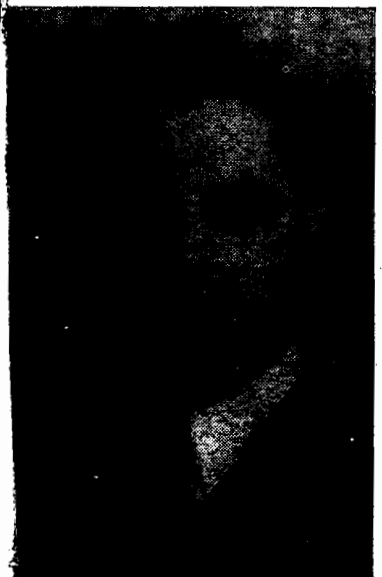

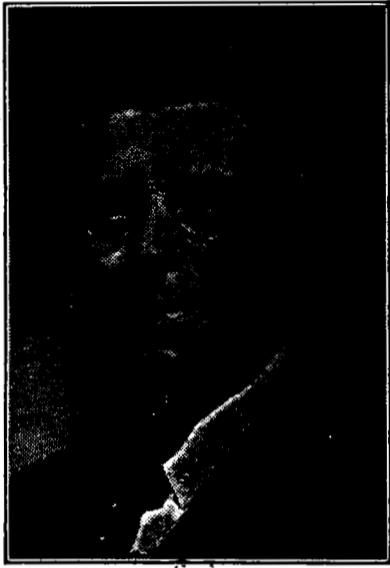

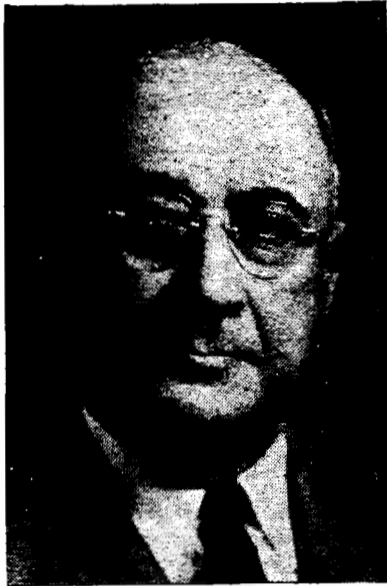

Kansas City, Kansas, Workers Report \$75,807.92, Which Is 24 Per Cent of Total.

"MUST KEEP THE PACE"

Edgar P. Schowalter, General Chairman, Says That Is the Only Way to Victory.

Leader Urges Helpers to Take Full Advantage of Favorable Weather.

Wyandotte County's War Fund campaign got off to a good start with a report today of \$75,807.92, which is 24 per cent of the total. This means \$233,722.08 must be obtained for the \$309,530 fund.

"This is a prediction of success, providing we maintain our tempo of work and determination for the remainder of the campaign," Edgar P. Schowalter, general chairman, told workers today.

Must Keep the Pace. "We'll do it if we will it," he said, but warned that there is much work ahead and the fine weather won't last indefinitely.

As contrasted with the 19 per cent accounted for in the first War Fund report last year, Schowalter feels that a good start has been made to obtain the gifts so vital to those who suffer here at home and in foreign countries.

The business division headed by M. M. Christensen was leading with 58 per cent of its quota turned in. Already over their goals were the teams of Virgil Peppardine, the Rev. Elmer D. Russell and J. C. Harmon.

Although the men started a week earlier than the women's residential team, the women were giving them a close race.

One Report of \$7,501.11. Mrs. Donald Medearis, chairman, reported a total of \$7,501.11 with Mrs. Joseph Cohen's team going over the top. The women have 43 per cent of their quota.

All advance gifts turned in by E. W. Stilwell's division, working for several weeks, were reported.

However, the amounts reported by the county and Negro divisions do not represent the volume of work done but are indicative that they are working. The county division has had a large amount of territory to cover and are counting on a big report for Friday. The Negroes are making their daily reports to the Monrovia club at 2068 North Fifth street and expect to go over the top.

With group solicitation reports four times as big as last year's first report, Schowalter feels that S. J. Figley and his workers have made a good start. However, this division carries a quota of \$136,835 and has \$125,000 to report to reach its goal.

Reports for Friday's noon meeting must be in the Chamber of Commerce, headquarters for the drive, by 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Europe Is the Theme. The Rev. H. N. Mejak of the Holy Family Catholic church gave the invocation and Dorothy Chelesnik led singing of the "Star-Spangled Banner" at the luncheon. The program represented the people of many of the European countries which will receive assistance from the War Fund.

Mejak, the Rev. John Zoltanoga, Dr. Peter Bourbaki and Miss Julia Frisbie, president of the Women's Chamber of Commerce; Mrs. D. N. Medearis, M. M. Christensen and Merritt Owens, vice-chairman of the drive.

Members of the Women's Chamber of Commerce met with the group.

Broad Program Is Outlined For Jewish Council

Joseph Cohen Again Elected To Head Community Group

A broad program of activities for 1944 was outlined at the annual meeting of the Jewish Community Council held last week in the Jewish Community Center. More than 100 representatives of affiliated agencies and organizations attended the meeting.

Joseph Cohen was reelected president of the Council for the sixth term. Elected to other offices were: Irvin Fane, O. J. Granoff and Ernest Peiser, vice presidents; Leon Fink, secretary, and Louis Brown, treasurer.

* * *

These important functions of the council were reported to the representatives:

1. The Bureau of Community Relations, established two months ago, has undertaken a program of inter-religious and inter-cultural relationship, and has set up a department to handle complaints of discriminations and special problems which confront the Jewish community.

2. A planning commission, consisting of representatives of the Jewish Community Council, the Jewish Welfare Federation, and the United Jewish Social Services, has undertaken a long range planning program to provide for a greater cooperation and coordination between agencies engaged in social service work.

3. The army and navy committee of the Jewish Welfare Board is daily engaged in meeting the needs of Jewish service in the Kansas City area.

Joseph Cohen, in his annual report, pointed to the importance of a community council in the life of Kansas City Jewry. "The council is being successful in fulfilling its purpose, that of making possible united action on those matters in which substantial agreement could be obtained, and to secure a better understanding of those items on which no complete agreement could be reached. It has become the responsible voice of the Jewish community, replacing self-appointed and oft times irresponsible spokesmen. It also has developed and broadened the base of community leadership, and helped fashion an intelligent and articulate public opinion."

Millard Mayer, chairman of the Community Relations Bureau, reported on the work already accomplished by the Bureau. More than 25,000 pamphlets and books have been distributed, he said, carrying messages of importance to the community. Bureau speakers have participated in a number of forums on minority problems, and a large number of matters of discrimination have been handled by the bureau office.

* * *

Nathan Cohen, director of the bureau, spoke on anti-Semitism in the United States, and pointed to the many agencies and individuals who have joined in formulating an intelligent and effective program to combat racial prejudices.

Max Bretton, executive secretary of the Community Council gave a comprehensive report on the program of planning which has been undertaken, a program which he said will have far reaching effect on the complete integration of social service work in the Jewish Community. One of the matters being discussed at present is the future location of the proposed new Appleman Home for the aged, and the advisability of placing the institution on the grounds of the Menorah hospital, he said.

Isadore Rich, chairman of the army and navy committee, reported more than a half ton of turkeys were sent to nearby camps for Passover seder services, in addition to a large quantity of matzo's and other holiday foods.

One-Fourth of Way on War Fund

First Report on Campaign Shows \$75,807 Collected; Tops 1943 Start.

Power and momentum of Wyandotte county's United War Fund drive clinched a first report of \$75,807.92 at the noon luncheon today at campaign headquarters.

That total is 24.49 per cent of the over-all goal of \$309,530. Today's report exceeded the total of 19.5 per cent established on the first report of the campaign last year.

In three more reports the army of workers must secure the additional sum of \$233,722.08.

In today's report Edgar P. Schowalter, commander-in-chief, sees prediction of success providing the same tempo and determination is maintained by every workers throughout the entire campaign.

"I think we'll do it if we will," Schowalter stated when he announced the total for today.

Take Advantage of Weather

But he reminded workers to take advantage of the weather. "Luck is fickle, you know, and this perfect weather can't go on forever just as a convenience to us," he warned.

Leading among the seven soliciting divisions today was the business division, commanded by M. M. Christensen, with report of \$6,603.83, or 58.96 per cent of its quota of \$11,200. Three teams in that division went over the top today. Leading those teams are Virgil Pepperdine, reporting 127.85 per cent of quota; Rev. Elmer D. Russell, with 104.55 per cent, and J. C. Harmon, with 103.42 per cent.

Runner-up among the divisions was the women's residential division, headed by Mrs. Donald N. Medearis, reporting a total to date of \$7,501.11, or 43.38 per cent of the quota of \$17,300.

First and only team in the residential division over the top is that led by Mrs. Joseph Cohen, with \$1,091.30, or 103.44 per cent of the quota.

Praises Leaders

Praising those divisions, Schowalter pointed out that the business division has been working a week prior to the drive and has done a magnificent job. But the women, he pointed out, started from scratch Monday and their total today speaks eloquently of the work they are doing. "They're crowding the men," he declared.

Other division leaders reported as follows today:

Advance gifts "A." E. W. Stillwell, \$50,278.75, or 39.07 per cent.

Advance gifts "B." Lyle W. Weeks, \$1,002, or 15.18 per cent.

County. Mrs. Charles NovoGradac, \$117, or 2.54 per cent.

Negro. A. B. Howard, \$162, or 5.59 per cent.

Group solicitation. S. J. Figley, \$10,142.23, or 7.41 per cent.

Figley's report for the group solicitation division today is four times as large as the division reported on the first day of the campaign last year. But that division has the biggest quota in the campaign, a total of \$136,835, about 44 per cent of the over-all goal. Figley's workers must secure the additional sum of about \$126,000 in three more reports.

War Fund Set For Campaign In Two Cities

Jewish Welfare Federation Again Joins City Drive, Goal Is \$2,300,000

With the Jewish Welfare Federation of Greater Kansas City continuing as an affiliated agency, the War Fund will open its 1944 campaign for funds on October 18 with several thousand Kansas Citians enrolled as campaign workers. The goal this year is \$2,300,000, unchanged from last year.

* * *

The two Kansas Cities will hold their campaigns simultaneously, and the Federation will receive approximately \$285,000 from the Kansas City, Mo., Fund and about \$15,000 from the Kansas City, Kan., Fund. Under the War Fund plan, in which fund raising of welfare organizations is united in a single drive for funds, the Jewish Welfare Federation does not undertake an individual drive — although members of the Federation individuals will participate in the campaign as team captains and solicitors.

* * *

The War Fund this year is providing a supplementary subscription card for the United Jewish Appeal which, because of increased opportunities in the field of rescue and rehabilitation, must raise a national quota of 32 million dollars. Campaign solicitors will have this card available for members of the Jewish community.

* * *

That's the curse of having once been a reporter.

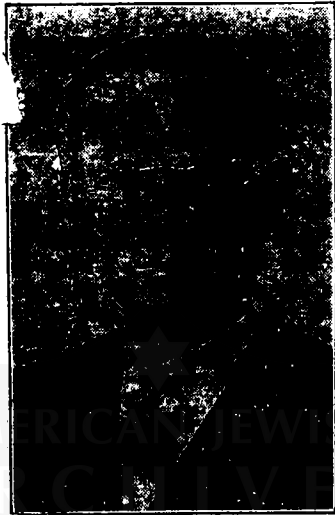

Excerpts of Cohen's Message

In the President's Message of outgoing President Joseph Cohen, the remarkable work of B'nai B'rith was delineated in a clear-cut fashion of high informative value to the world outside of the B'nai B'rith lodge rooms.

Excerpts from the message follow:

"We have shouldered our full responsibility in endeavoring to open up the immigration gates of this continent to a larger quota of those who are involuntarily exiled from Germany.

"Twenty-six or more national organizations, avowedly anti-Semitic, are disseminating poison against our people . . . I would be greatly concerned for the future of Jewry in

America were it not for the great work of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League. By educational literature, through speakers, by means of many and various publications, by an appeal to truth and reason at all times, it has been a most powerful agency for maintaining the equilibrium of American public opinion.

"Our Social Committee continues to render useful service. Jewish men and women in penal institutions are being helped to mend their broken lives . . . Sabbath and holiday religious services are held for them; advice and consultations are given; contacts and communications between prisoners and their families are arranged; books and other reading matter are furnished; employment has been found for them . . . Jewish boys enrolled in the Citizens' Military Training Camps and the Civilian Conservation Camps have been the objects of our assistance, also students in colleges having no Hillel Foundations . . . Jewish inmates in hospitals are helped . . . Erring boys have been aided through our activities with the juvenile courts . . . Disadvantaged Jewish boys have been sent to summer health camps."

Mr. Kusworm traced briefly the history of the Jew and his struggle for political equality.

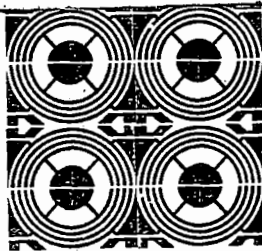

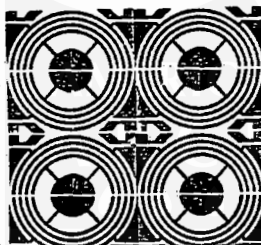

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Leo H. Pollock Promoted To Captaincy at Air Base

McCLELLAND FIELD, CAL. (Special)—Dr. Leo H. Pollock, a former surgeon in Kansas City, has been promoted to captain at Sacramento Air Service Command, Sacramento, Cal. This army air force installation is one of eleven air service command area control stations in the United States from which planes often fly directly to combat zones and AAF supplies are shipped to the far corners of the earth.

Captain Pollock is assistant chief, surgical service, at this west coast air service command installation where military and civilian personnel work together to supply and maintain the United States army air force throughout the world.

One of the largest of America's industrial enterprises and a vital support of the army air force, air service command, with its vast system of supply and maintenance, keeps aircraft in the air in all battle zones—the Southwest Pacific, the Mediterranean and the European areas.

A graduate of the University of Kansas medical school, Captain Pollock was commissioned a first lieutenant in October, 1943. He entered active service a month later. Before he was ordered to Sacramento air service command in April 1944, he had been stationed at Ft. Leavenworth, at Patterson Field, Ohio, and at Kelly Field, Tex.

During his university years, Captain Pollock was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa, Alpha Omega Alpha and Phi Delta Epsilon.
