
Dear Dr. Cohen:

Now that the Galveston Committee has closed its work, I want to express to the members of the Committee my deep appreciation of the co-operation and valuable advice I have received from you as one of my colleagues on the Committee, in the effort on our part to solve an important problem of great and lasting value - both to the immigrant, as well as to our own country.

In this I believe we have a right to feel that we have in a measure succeeded, for, aside from the fact that we have settled almost 10,000 immigrants in the vast hinterland of the United States, everyone of whom is likely to form, more or less, a center of attraction for others to follow, we have acquired experience which is certain to be most useful in further efforts, which must come to deflect immigration into and through the overcrowded cities of the North Atlantic Coast to ports where it can be more practically distributed over the sections of the United States where the immigrant is actually needed and where his well-being can be better assured than in the large centers of the Eastern part of the United States.
