

JEWISH CHAPLAINS INSIGNIA







Deuteronomy Chapter 20, verses 2-4



















Birth:

Feb. 8, 1820, Germany

Death:

Aug. 15, 1878 Memphis Shelby County Tennessee, USA

Rev. Ferdinand Sarner, D.D. Born in Lissa, Germany, now Leszno,

Called the "Rabbi of Gettysburg," where he was wounded.

Third Jewish Chaplain in U.S. Armed Forces and first to serve in battle (at Gettysburg).

Education: Studied at the Royal Friedrich Wilhelm University, now Humboldt University in Berlin and at the University of Hesse, from which he received a Ph.D. in 1858.
